Routine Proceedings

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Paproski): No, I am not surprised, except the hon. member has been on questions and comments all the time and I figured he wanted another question or comment.

Mr. Nunziata: As you may know, Mr. Speaker, we are paid a handsome salary around here and I am simply earning my keep today by participating in the debate on this particular recommendation.

I am sure my constituents are not really familiar with the House management committee. What we are debating is report No. 23 of the House management committee. What is the House management committee, one might ask?

The House management committee—and it is becoming more open as time progresses—consists of certain members of Parliament from each of the political parties. It is the committee that, up until recently, was very secretive. The members of that committee decide how to run this place. They decide on such matters as the parliamentary restaurant, shoe shine facilities, framing, all the expenditures associated with the operation of the House of Commons.

An hon. member: Haircuts too.

Mr. Nunziata: Haircuts as well. As you know, Mr. Speaker, you and I do not often use the parliamentary barber. It is really not a necessity for us. But yes, the committee decides the price of haircuts, shaves and everything else in the rooms downstairs.

This committee is generally made up of senior members of each of the caucuses. For example, the member for Saint-Denis is a member of that committee. He is the dean of the House of Commons. The member for Kingston and the Islands is a member of the committee, the member for Glengarry—Prescott—Russell, and the assistant parliamentary whoever he is on the other side of the House. These are part of the A team in the House of Commons. The member for Broadview—Greenwood referred to them as the élite. They are a group of people who have some authority around here.

There are others in this House—the member for Broadview—Greenwood and myself—who are not part of that inner circle of individuals. Yes, we are part of the B team, and the member from Chambly is also part of the B team on the New Democratic Party side.
