of space and not a word about research. I suppose, should the Administrative Committee meet to discuss research only that no invitation would be sent that day to the University member.

I have tried to co-operate in every way, but every time I agree to one proposition somebody comes forward with something different and one which requires the University to retire a little further into the background. I have backed up on more than one occasion and now you ask me practically to get off the map altogether.

As to this matter of fundamental research, surely we agreed that when problems came up in your industry on which fundamental research was necessary or valuable that such problem would be turned over to the Cellulose Department to study and to seek solution and that all other research, technical, semi-commercial, semi-fundamental or anything else you have a mind to call it would be considered by the other section of research workers. If we did not agree to this I simply cannot understand the King's English.

Your latest chart, Mr. Hovey, is less acceptable to me than any chart I have seen yet, because in addition to embracing and involving everything that any other chart set forth, it also intimates that the University has only representation on the Administrative Committee by the grace of an invitation.
