There has been no lack of economy in the management of affairs, and the cost per student, as compared with English universities, is low. Sheffield, with 354 full-time students, costs \$588 per capita; Manchester, with 1642 students, \$365; Birmingham, with 868, \$359; University College, London, with 907, \$300; and Toronto, with 3820, \$227.

The attendance at Toronto University has risen from 3038 in 1906 to 4136. Owing to the raising of the examination standards, the attendance for four years past has been kept down to some extent, but the students flock in, and new buildings and equipment are needed, and an increase in the staff. 
