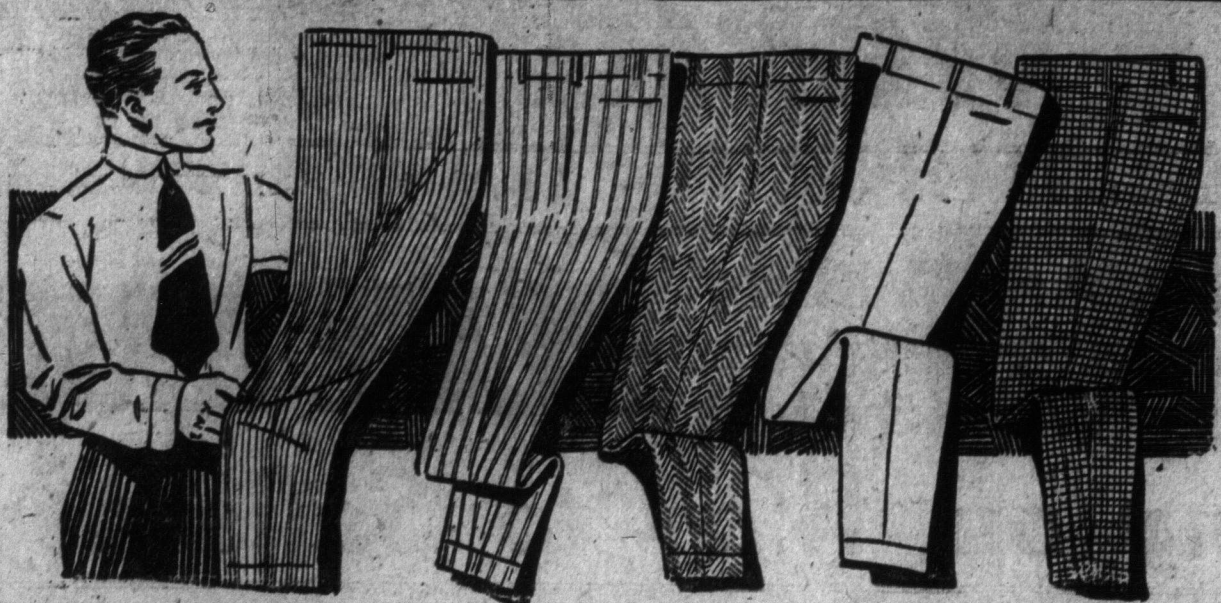

NATURAL DEATH IS JURY'S VERDICT

No Evidence That Daniel P. Heaney Was Victim of Foul Play.

WAS NOT DROWNED

Lay Down on Mimico Beach When Seized With Sudden Illness.

"Death from natural cause" was the verdict brought in by the jury at the inquest into the death of Daniel Patrick Heaney, whose body was found on Mimico beach on Thursday of last week. The adjourned inquest was resumed in Newcomb's Hotel, Humber Bay, last night, before Coroner Dr. Carman Ricker.

The most important evidence was that of the doctors, who made the post-mortem examination. Dr. G. Silvertown of St. Michael's Hospital, and Dr. George W. Graham of 255 Avenue Road.

The cause of death was not apparent, said Dr. Silvertown, but the absence of marks, internal or external, indicated that it could not have been by violence. The man had been dead some time, but how long it was difficult to say. The state of decomposition of the body, however, seemed to indicate that it had lain in the position found from last fall. One could not say the man had died from drowning, because the remains being so decomposed, the marks would have disappeared. No marks would remain had death been due to exhaustion, or to such a disease as diabetes, which would cause a man to lie down and fall into a sleep from which he would not awake.

In reply to a question by Crown Attorney Greer, Dr. Silvertown said there was absolutely no fracture of either of long bones or skull and no evidence even of a bruise.

Hand in Pocket. "I am informed that when the body was found the right hand was in the pocket," said Mr. Greer. "Do you think it probable a man drowning would retain one hand in his pocket?" "No. It would be a most unusual thing," said Dr. Silvertown. "I think one can fairly rule out the question of drowning."

Replying to Dr. Ricker the witness said that apoplexy could also be ruled out, as from the examination of the brain he judged death was not due to that cause.

After thorough examination, he had concluded the man from the spot showed no evidence of blood. The man had been healthy and fairly well nourished. His physical deformity was not a contributing factor.

This evidence was corroborated by Dr. Graham. He was quite convinced the man did not die by violence, and thought death had occurred before the cold weather set in. "Each weather would retard the period of decomposition," he said.

Brother's Evidence.

Evidence of identification was given by James Heaney, a brother, living at 142 Tecumseh street. He had seen his brother last about four weeks before Christmas, the end of November or beginning of December.

WESTON

The canvassers reported a membership of 140 at last night's meeting of the Weston Horticultural Society. Each member is entitled to options for plants and flowers valued at from \$1 to \$3. It was decided to hold over the ordering of the premiums till Monday next and to keep the lists open till then, a membership of about 150 being anticipated.

Red Cross. The treasurer of the Weston Red Cross Society reports that the net proceeds of the entertainment held in the high school were \$304.50. Yesterday a large shipment of supplies, including 100 pairs socks, 45 military shirts, 25 hospital shirts and quantities of bandages and towels, was made by the Weston branch to the headquarters at Toronto for distribution at the front.

HIGHWAY BOARD MET TO OPEN TENDERS

Tenders for oil, tar and stone for the county roads were opened by the York County Highway Board at a special meeting yesterday, and referred to the engineer for a report. Bids were also received for paving Weston Main street, but no definite decision was made. From the tenders submitted, Engineer E. G. James estimates that the cost of road construction in the county this year will average as follows: Macadam, about \$7,000 per mile; tar macadam about \$8,000, and concrete about \$10,000 per mile.

Today the commission will inspect the roads in the eastern districts of the county, with a view to mapping out the summer program.

WOULD HAVE T.S.R. BUILD CIVIC CARS

Original Suggestion Made at Meeting of Roden Ratepayers.

WORK FOR UNEMPLOYED

Are Not Satisfied That Council is Doing All That is Possible.

A prolonged discussion, which frequently became heated and personal, took place at a meeting of the Roden Ratepayers' Association, in the Roden School last night, to determine if the last meeting, at which officers were elected, was a regular one.

The controversy was commenced by J. G. Smithson, the secretary, who stated that several members of the association had complained that the meeting was out of order, which made the election of officers irregular. J. Mulvaney declared that the members had received notification of the meeting, and claimed that the proceedings were perfectly in order. "I would like to ask Mr. Smithson to explain a statement which he made to the effect that F. Morgan, who was elected president at the meeting, in question, was not a qualified member, and therefore not eligible for office," said Mr. Smithson.

Mr. Smithson stated that according to his records, no fee had been paid by Mr. Morgan. In the meantime the president had vacated the chair and denied the statement made by the secretary. He stated that 50 cents had been paid to the secretary one morning in the street car, and another 25 cents had also been paid. Mr. Smithson stated that if such was the case the payments would be recorded in his diary, which was at his house, and he promised to look into the matter.

Vice-President Scott, who took the chair, stated that in his opinion the meeting had been perfectly regular, and the discussion was terminated by the members adopting a motion to this effect.

Build Cars Here. In connection with the unemployment question President Morgan suggested that the Toronto Street Railway company could build cars equally as good as any firm in the States or Canada, and the city should approach them in this regard, so as to provide work for the unemployed in the city.

J. Mulvaney thought that the council should take some action to prevent men who come into the city for the winter, after spending the remainder of the year in the country, from becoming a burden to the ratepayers.

He declared that he knew men who openly boasted that they could come into the city during the winter and live on charity.

Could Do More.

The president claimed that the city council had not done all that they could for the unemployed. He complained that the contractors for the Bloor street viaduct were employing very few men from Toronto.

Several suggestions regarding the needs of the district were brought up and will be acted upon by the executive.

BUILDING PROSPECTS ARE MUCH BRIGHTER

Quite a Number of Houses Under Construction in North End.

SOME EXPERT OPINIONS

Fairly Brisk Demand for Small Market Garden Properties.

While the number of buildings actually under construction in the northern part of the city, more especially the district to the north of the C.P.R. tracks, is small, the outlook, according to building inspectors and builders generally, is gradually picking up. In ordinary seasons there would not be any pronounced movement at the early period in the season, so that the outlook under the war conditions shows good ground for optimism.

"I notice a great improvement in my district, between the C.P.R. tracks and Eglinton avenue, on the north, and over as far as Spadina avenue west and Moore Park north, at the east," said Frank Jackson, building inspector in the district named, in The World last night.

Decidedly Brighter. "In the hill district the building is of course confined to the better class of residences, the speculative element being very small there," said Mr. Jackson.

Among others noted was the new \$8000 residence for Mr. Woodcock on Poplar Plains crescent, and a new residence for Mr. Wightman on Wightman avenue, just north of the Clair, which is replacing an old one being torn down. Mr. Gibson is putting up five or six good houses near the corner of Lyndhurst avenue and Wells Hill. In the Deer Park section fine residences on Gordon avenue are in the Moore Park section.

In the buildings started last fall are now finished, and there are no indications of a very busy summer yet. It is claimed by the Moore Park section that the uncertainty regarding the Bloor street car line is holding back building in that part of the city, and that while two or three good houses are planned, there will be no movement pending some action by the city.

Up in the Davisville and Eglinton sections of the city the outlook is bright. Davis Bros. will soon have a number of good houses under way on Eglinton avenue, and several others are planned.

In addition to the many fine residences already built in Glendale, Mr. W. S. Dimmock stated last week that already ten new houses are contracted for in the Manor and in Lawrence Park fully a dozen. As showing the growth of the city northward, Dimmock said that the demand for small farms at Willowdale, one of the Devoncourt Land Company's possessions, is wonderfully increasing.
