gravation of our Misfortunes, and will add to our Disgrace. And yet it is to be apprehended that France, after having put her Marine in Order, and in some degree repaired other Damages enfuing from a War, will presume on her Success, will presume on the Indignities to which Great Britain has submitted by this Treaty, will pursue, her. Blow, and add Infult to Infult, carrying herfelf with that Height of Pride, as if the Genius of France had gained the Ascendant over the Genius of Great Britain, 'till she provoke the British Spirit to a new War. Nor is this Peace in any other Respect calculated to prevent future Broils; but on the contrary the Seeds of new Disturbances are evidently preferved. Our Right to the Demolition of the Works of Dunkirk on the Sea-side is not expressly given up, the Means of coming at that Right are given up; nor was there Courage in our Ministry to fix that Affair either one way or the other. We are on such a Footing with Spain, in respect to the Treaty of Commerce of 1713, that no one can think any folid Foundation of Amity laid between the two Nations. Nor can I pais over in Silence the Neglect
