NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Swedish sporting implements, such as will be used in the hammer, shot, javelin and discus throwing contests in the Olympic games at Stockholm next summer, have arrived here. They will be inspected by the American Olympic committee at a meeting here next week and unless some fault is found with them a number of specimens of the samples will be reproduced and distributed all over the country for trials.


