LABOR NEWS
The petition from the Brotherhood of Carpenters to the governor-general for clemency in the case of Charles Watson, recently sentenced to three years at Kingston Penitentiary for being in possession of a banned rifle, and also for the direct repeal of orders-in-council detrimental to the interests of the workers, has been signed by nearly 2,000 people. The entire labor movement is in accord with the object of the petition.

"Strikes should not be resorted to to obtain redress for the abuse of power," said Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, yesterday to the press. "The only proper course," he said, "is thru the opposition in the house of commons, and, failing this, to create opinion which will bring about the return of another government."
