In Turner v. Appelby, at the non-jury sutings, Justice Rose, at the conclusion of the case, gave judgment dismissing the action, with cost of action and counter-claim of Mrs. Drew.

Mr. W. J. McMurtry, who trades as the Gold Medal Furnithre Company, brings an action for deceit against Mr. James Lumbers, the well-known wholesale merciant on Front-street east, Toronto. Mr. Lumbers leased by deed to Mr. McMurtry certain premises at the foot of Bay-street for three years and two mouths, from Dec. 1, 1896. The lease contained a provision that in the event of Mr. Lumbers' disposing or the premises Mr. McMurtry, the lesse, would vacate at the expiration of six months' previous notice, or on payment to him of \$350 as a bonus. Mr. Lumbers claims that he sold, or in perfect good faith entered into an agreement to sell or dispose of, the premises, and gave notice accordingly, on Dec. 31, 1896. Mr. McMurtry claims that Mr. Lumbers never really som, but only pretended to sell, to get rid of his tenant, and that he (McMurtry) vacatee the premises virtually under compulsion on March 1, 1897, and he brings this action for \$2550 damages for injury to his business, occasioned by his having to find other premises and move af such a time. 
