P. C. WARD IDENTIFIED JONES

Preliminary Investigation into the Charge of Attempting to Enter Standard Bank Begun.

CROWN WITNESSES TESTIFY.

Female Relative of Rutledge Gave Some Damaging Evidence

Against Prisoners in Court.

Rutledge, Rice and Jones were brought into the Police Court yesterday and the preliminary investigation into the charge of attempting to enter the Standard Bank in Parkdale was proceeded with. The evidence was given by Constable Ward, who was tied up by the robbers, was quite sensational. He saw two men standing near the bank and asked them what they were doing out so late. After a word or two Jones whipped out a revolver and said, "Throw up your hands." "Where were you going?" asked his captor. "I was going to the station to report," said Ward. "If you don't show up what will they do?" "They will send someone out to look for me," said Ward. "I caused the guard to go to the stable door and urge his pals to hurry. The robbers gave the job up later on and Constable Ward was discovered and liberated by a nightwatchman. The Crown sprung a surprise when they produced Patrol Sgt. Robinson, who swore that a quarter of an hour before Ward was held up he saw Jones and Rice at the corner of Brock-avenue and Queen-street, 75 paces from the bank. He was positive as to Rice and was reasonably sure as to Jones. Mrs. Rutledge, wife of Charles Rutledge, brother of the prisoner, Frank Rutledge, was examined. The attempt on the bank was on the night of May 21 last, at which time Mrs. Rutledge kept a restaurant at 488 Yonge-street. About May 22, the three prisoners and a fourth man named Austin arrived in Toronto and became lodgers at the witness' establishment. Rice and Rutledge roomed together and Jones and Austin. Mrs. Rutledge remembered having put up a luncheon for them one day when they said they were going fishing, but she could not be absolutely certain of the date. After the robbery the prisoners left Toronto so hurriedly that they did not have time to take their valises, and Mrs. Rutledge got a telegram, asking her to cross to Lewis and send one of them by express to "Frank Dwyer, Chicago." Mrs. Rutledge also testified that both ladies are hostesses to the Crown. They went to Chicago to see the prisoners during the extradition proceedings. Other witnesses called were William Myers, tailor, who had made suits for the prisoners; Joe Richards, who had discovered stolen Albert Albin, who had been stolen from the witness' establishment; Norman Henderson, who had seen Rice, Rutledge and another man driving furiously towards Toronto, and Provincial Detective Grew. FOREIGN BEEF EXCLUDED NOW.

War Office Contracts Made at Present Exclude All But Home-Prepared Meats. London, April 19.—Answering a question in the House of Commons to-day, the Financial Secretary of the War Office, Lord Stanley, confirmed the report that all the contracts now made extended the supplying of foreign meats in the case of all troops in the United Kingdom. The Under Secretary of the Staff Office, Lord Cranborne, replying to a question, said that the Russian flag still flew over the custom house at New Chungking, and that the customs were collected by a Chinese staff, turned over to the Russian authorities and held by them in trust, subject to future settlement.

Free Air Pump.

WON'T GIVE THEM AN ARMORY.

St. Catharines People Think the Government is "Getting Even" With Their Crack Regiment. St. Catharines, April 19.—Capt. J. T. Groves, quartermaster of the 19th Regiment (St. Catharines), has resigned as a protest against the Government's want of action in providing an armory for that corps. There are three branches of the militia stationed in St. Catharines, the 19th, 7th Field Battery and 2nd Dragoons, and the officers find it impossible to maintain a proper standard of efficiency owing to the fact that the drilling has to be done in the open air. The old ramshackle drill shed was blown down by the cyclone three years ago, and the Government promised a new armory. Last fall the contract was let at \$57,000, and the work began, but on Nov. 7 something happened in Lincoln that hurt the feelings of the Government and "Wullie" Gibson. On that evening in the embrace of his job, exploded a firecracker from the window of the temporary regimental shelter, and the "lucky" bomb was reported to Ottawa. The late M.L.I. gets the credit for saying he would get even with the "Tory Nineteenth." At any rate, the contractor was ordered to stop the work, and the amount was not re-voiced in the estimates. It is almost impossible to get recruits, and other officers are expected to quit in disgust.

Amicus Lodge, Knights of Pythias.

It is becoming more and more evident that there is considerable "boom" in Pythian circles in Toronto. At the regular convention of the above lodge on Tuesday evening last, applications enough were received to keep the lodge officers busy with degree work for many nights to come. Visitors were present from every Pythian lodge in the city, who report the same conditions in their own lodges. The next convention of the above lodge will be devoted entirely to degree work.

News comes from Australia of the total destruction of the Canadian Protestant mission buildings in the New Hebrides on the island of Erromanga, in a storm.
