Ottawa, Dec. 15.—The City of Ottawa is to have a school of army signaling. Esal Dundonald, Major-General commanding the Canadian militia, has submitted a scheme for the establishment of this important school in the city. The general in his scheme suggests that the school shall consist of one officer and two or more non-commissioned officers, to be brought from Imperial Schools in England.
