BREAKWATER AT SUNNYSIDE

MUCH WORK MUST BE DONE

Ald. Graham Thinks Dominion Should

Aid—East Also Needs

Protection.

The board of works yesterday decided

to ask the property commissioners,

the city solicitor and the city engineer

to report on the best method of protect-

ing the beach along the Lake Shore-

road, and upon the legal questions in-

volved. There are many private own-

ers of water lots between Sunnyside

and the Harbour, whose interests will

be affected. Ald. Graham considers

that the Dominion Government should

assist in building the breakwater, as

it had given Hamilton \$300,000. On his

motion it was decided that the side-

walk should be temporarily repaired,

as nothing would be done with the

breakwater this year. The engineer

said the work would take from six to

nine months, but it would be necessary

for him to make a survey of the water

front, which would take some weeks.

Ald. Stewart was willing to help the

city, but he said the city should be

the one to construct the breakwater,

and the engineer was instructed to

ask the board of control for funds to

construct two groynes. Mr. Rust stated

that they would cost about \$200.

The engineer is to have the sand-

pump removed to the east end of Ash-

bridge's Bay, where it is to be used

for dredging.

There are incidental expenses in con-

nection with the breakwater, and the

provision of fourteen feet on Strachan-

avenue in the neighborhood of \$100,

and the firm will send in a cheque for

this amount.

Henry Swan appeared to ask for a

substantive payment on Woodward's

claim. He had a petition signed by 29

of the 41 property owners on the street,

and said there was a petition for the

others. Dr. Noble objected to

granting the petition, because the

Warren Co. had a monopoly, and he

was charging twice too much, at \$2.14

per square yard. City Engineer Rust

said the price was too high to be the

class of pavement to be open to

competition. The petition was grant-

ed, however.

The city solicitor wrote, advising the

committee to take no action in regard

to constructing a sewer on Patton-road,

as asked for by Fuddy Bros., without

having the question submitted to coun-

cil, however.

Ald. Geary drew attention to the re-

port of the provincial board of health

in regard to the disposal of city sew-

age, and moved that a sub-committee

composed of Ald. Noble, McGhee, Fos-

ter, Woods and Geary, be appointed to

co-operate with the board, which was

carried.

HOT WAVE SURE TO COME.

The Heat May Not Arrive Until the

Holiday.

The heat was fairly well distributed

over the Dominion yesterday and the

weather generally was fair and warm,

with local thunderstorms from Lake

Superior to the maritime provinces.

The dense fog of the past few days

hangs over the Bay of Fundy and the

rain. The weather service predicts

that the hot wave which passed over

the Northwest last week will reach

here tomorrow or Saturday, but did
