United States Govt. Owes Canadian Farmers Over Million for Excess Duty.

Ottawa, Dec. 11.-Petitions are once more being sent in to the Canadian Government asking them to renew the demand upon Washington for a settlement of the claims of Canadian farmers, 90 per cent of whom are in the Province of Quebec, for a refund of excess of duty collected about the year 1881 upon hay sent into the United States. The claims in question aggregate abou \$750,000, and with the addition of interest would make \$1,500,000. The circuit court of the northern district declared that the duties paid on the hay in question were double the amount called for by law. In spite of the justness of the claims they have not yet, although a quarter of a century has elapsed, been satisfied by the United States Government. On technical grounds payment has from time to time been evaded. This is not a very dignified proceeding for a great and wealthy nation like the United States. Another indebtedness to Canadians which the adjoining republic has failed to discharge is the cost of repairing a cable at Quebec, broken some years ago by a revenue cutter which had been granted permission by our Government to pass through the canal system from the upper lakes in order to reach the Atlantic. Apologies for the breakage were made at the time by the United States war department, coupled with a promise to pay. That was the last the sufferers heard of the matter, and up to date no reimbursement has been made. Perhaps it would be as well for the United States Government before undertaking to buy out Canada's rights in the seal fisheries or any other national asset to scan their accounts for the past 25 years and settle obligations which have been long overdue. They can then start with a clean sheet after paying off old scores.
