THE FAILURES OF 1906
Figures for Nine Months Make a Good Showing for Canada.

Dun's Review of Oct. 6 says: Insolventcies in the Dominion of Canada during the first nine months of 1906 were 867 in number, against 959 last year, while the amount of defaulted indebtedness was \$5,836,234, against \$7,105,495. Manufacturing failures were 212 in number and \$2,769,569 in amount, against 208 failures for \$2,269,992 in 1905.

Improvement was most noticeable in the trading section, where 37 failures occurred, involving \$3,615,425, compared with 739 last year, when liabilities were \$4,781,320.

There were 18 other commercial failures for \$441,045, against 12 last year, when the amount involved was only \$54,182.

Not a single banking failure occurred in the Dominion, whereas one of more failures occurred in the corresponding months of each of the preceding seven years.

The largest increase in a comparison by provinces was supplied by Quebec, but this was more than offset by smaller liabilities in Ontario, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, and especially Nova Scotia.

In the United States. Commercial failures in the United States during the first nine months of 1906 were 7,912 in number and \$84,660,237 in amount of liabilities. In the corresponding months of last year there were 8,506 failures, involving \$76,234,028. The decrease in number is more representative of actual trade conditions than the increase in liabilities, as there was a substantial improvement in both manufacturing and trading operations.

HEROES YEARS AGO; HISSSED THIS YEAR

Gotham Got Sore on Giants for Their Poor Showing This Season.

The New York Globe and Commercial Advertiser of a recent date contained the following:

The Giants are today wondering what sort of mortal the average baseball crank is. A year ago the Polo grounds heroes were idolized by the fans of Manhattan, who shouted the praises of the world's champions from the house-tops.

The fans considered it as much an honor to get a patronizing nod from one of the lords of the Giants as did the delighted person who shook the hand that had shaken the hand of Sullivan. To speak a few words to one of the superior persons who had won two league pennants and a world's championship was regarded more of an honor than to have one's picture on a tooth powder advertisement. If a champion condescended to smile at a fan and ask after his health the delighted recipient of the unusual courtesy took a half holiday and celebrated the event in a fitting and elaborate manner.

All winter long the fans dreamed of their beloved Giants and estimated just how many days would elapse before the heroic diamond stars would return and resume their wonderful feats on the ball field.

They came at last in the spring, and were received with demonstrations of extravagant joy. For a time the Giants did well, and even when they fell behind in the race the ready excuse of crippled players was accepted by the forgiving fans.

But when the team, bolstered up by two \$10,000 bonuses, failed to make up the lost ground, and was left far in the rear by the Cubs, there was grumbling and discontent, which steadily grew.

The climax came yesterday, when the beloved Giants, still wearing the words "World's Champions," on their breasts, were subjected to jeers, hisses and cat-calls from the fans who a year ago considered it an honor to be snubbed by one of the champions.

The humiliating double-trooping at the hands of the Chicagoans was the immediate cause of the complete change of attitude.

Before the first game started there was a general tendency on the part of the fans to make allowances for the Giants, but when Witte and Mathewson were both hammered all over the lot and the result being a grotesque exhibition, the result being two disgraceful defeats for the home team, and three successive victories for the Cubs, the forbearance of the fans came to an end.

Any time a Giant hit the ball or fielded it without error, which by the way was seldom, the fans indulged in ironical cheering.

It was a sad, sad spectacle, and the Giants, smarting under the lash of adverse criticism, became sullen and morose.

Wherein the Giants made a lamentable mistake was in supposing that their baseball glory could last beyond the past. They seemed to think that the fans
