COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE THE RADIAL PROBLEM

Drury Government To Seek Facts, Says Toronto Newspaper.

GETS EXPERT ADVICE

Premier Wants To Know If Scheme Is Financially Sound.

TORONTO, July 2.—The Ontario Government contemplates the appointment of a royal commission of three members to investigate and report upon the whole problem of radial railways under the jurisdiction of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, according to the Evening Telegram. The Telegram says that while the personnel of the commission has not been arranged as yet, names so far suggested are those of Chief Justice Sir William Meredith, Justice Hodgins of the superior court, and Thomas Bradshaw, former commissioner of finance for Toronto.

Further the Telegram says: "We want to know, and we are not going ahead until we do know," said Premier Drury this afternoon when questioned regarding the delay in the Provincial Government authorizing the transfer of the Guelph radial lines from the Dominion Government to the hydro-electric commission. "We are securing expert advice regarding the whole radial situation. We want to know if it is a sound financial project, because if it is not we do not want to saddle the people with it. The Guelph radial line is but part of one huge scheme, and the Government must deal with it as such. There is no need to rush. We must be patient. The attitude of the Government today is the same as when I told the deputations from the municipalities that we must be sure of the financial end."

COUNT IN WINNIPEG ELECTION CONTINUES

WINNIPEG, July 2.—Today's counting in Winnipeg's provincial election vote had, up to noon, eliminated McMartin, Conservative; Law, Government; Mrs. Skinner, Conservative; James, Labour; Fisher, Independent; and Lightfoot, Conservative.

At 10 o'clock John T. Haig, Conservative, was declared elected, the first of his party to win in the city.

OPIUM DENS UNDER GUISE OF LAUNDRIES, STATE DETECTIVES

Detroit Drug Addicts Followed To Laundries During Investigation.

WINDSOR, July 2.—Efforts to clean up Windsor's opium dens, which the police believe are being operated in scores under the guise of laundries which dot the town, were instituted today when a raid was conducted on premises at the corner of Douglass avenue and Wyandotte street, and a quantity of opium and smoking equipment was confiscated. Lee King, the proprietor of the place, was arrested, charged with selling narcotics illegally. Chee Lock, another Celestial, is being held as a frequent.

Systematic Cleaning. Detectives, who have been working quietly for weeks, declared tonight that scores of drug addicts from Detroit had been followed, and were seen to enter and leave laundries in Windsor. As the result of the probe which has been in effect, a systematic clean-up of dens is promised tonight, under the direction of Crown Attorney Rodd.

CARRIERS OF RURAL MAIL GET TOGETHER UNDER ASSOCIATION

Garfield MacKinnon of Guelph Named Secretary-Treasurer.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(By Canadian Press).—At a largely attended meeting of rural mail contractors here today the Canadian Rural Mail Contractors' Association was formed. It includes in its membership all the members of the Ontario Rural Mail Contractors' Association as well as mail contractors from Quebec. Garfield MacKinnon of Guelph, Ont., was appointed secretary-treasurer of the new association for a term of three years. He will devote all his time to looking after the interests of the association throughout Canada, and will be required to appear before the Government from time to time in the interests of the mail contractors. Strong resolutions urging all rural mail contractors from every province of Canada to join the new association at once were passed.

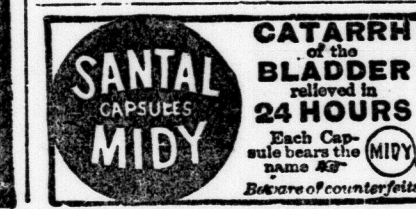
MEASLES EPIDEMIC GROWS IN ONTARIO

TORONTO, July 2.—The epidemic of measles is increasing in Ontario, according to reports from the provincial health department. There were 3,613 cases of measles reported in June, this being the second highest number in any one month for the past twenty years, with the exception of March, 1916, when there were 5,000 cases with deaths. The deaths last month totalled 22. In May, 1920, 46 deaths from measles out of 2,254 cases. Smallpox is also on the increase, though no deaths were reported for June. There were 349 smallpox cases reported for June, an increase of 59 over the previous month.

BORDEN RELIES ON USUAL SOFT SOAP IN CAUCUS

Address Paints Glowing Picture of Work of Union Government.

DISPLAYS OPTIMISM

Dilates On Fine Working Majority and Good Policy of Party.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(By the Canadian Press).—A summary of Sir Robert Borden's address to the caucus yesterday morning has been given to the press this evening. In it the prime minister informed his followers that any further attempt on his part to carry on the onerous duties of his office would lead to a relapse in his health; that his medical advisers at best could only hold out hope of recovery after one year of complete rest, and that the direction of affairs of Canada today could not properly be carried out by a prime minister who must spend his next year away from his duties. Therefore, Sir Robert had reluctantly decided on his resignation.

The prime minister reviewed the history of Union Government from its formation and through the trying years of the war. The Canadian people in December, 1917, had elected the Union Government. The chief purpose for which that Government was formed was the successful prosecution of the war. That supreme purpose had been abundantly accomplished, and the Canadian forces were maintained in the field up to armistice day up to complete strength and in highest efficiency. The answer of the Canadian people in 1917, Sir Robert stated, had gone like a trumpet call throughout the empire and the world. The Allies and the enemy alike recognized the unquestionable spirit of the British dominions.

Differed Politically. The men forming Union Government were of different political beliefs. When the war was ended they had to decide whether to continue their common endeavor, or whether they should discontinue their association. This was the situation when the prime minister's health gave way last September, and he was compelled to go away until December to rest. Sir Robert stated that he had soon realized that he had not the strength to resume his duties, and he placed himself in the hands of his medical advisers, who urged him to improve his position. One of them had said that after a year's complete respite from work he might resume his duties, but the others would be lightened and consequent strain diminished.

Since his return, the premier stated, "I have had the opportunity of testing my capacity for resumption of duties, and I am convinced beyond all question to continue as prime minister means a constant and unrelenting struggle against impaired health and strength. Last December the most sanguine estimate of my condition demanded a complete respite from active work for at least a year. Any such advice was a counsel of perfection which, as you must realize, was wholly impracticable. The prime minister of this Dominion under present conditions could not and should not abandon his duties for any such period. On the contrary, the situation requires complete possession of full health and vigor, and the person who is called upon to fulfill the responsibilities of the premiership."

Under these circumstances, it would be most unfair to the country and to my supporters in Parliament if I did not relinquish as soon as possible the position which I now hold. Any difficulties consequent upon my retirement would be increased tenfold if I should struggle on for a few months and then release into the physical weakness which beset me last session. Perhaps I may venture to say that, even from considerations personal to myself, this sacrifice ought not to be demanded. I entered public life in 1896, and four years afterwards I was elected leader of the Liberal-Conservative party, when it was at the nadir of its fortunes. For more than ten years I led that party in opposition and for nearly nine years have been prime minister. For more than four years of the latter period our country was involved in struggle, effort and sacrifice wholly unprecedented in our history.

Reconstruction Problem. For fully two years we have been facing the problems of reconstruction. The strain imposed upon our ministers since August, 1917, is not to be measured by years. It has left its effect on every member of the Administration and notably myself. May I add that, although the path of duty was not always to be discerned clearly, I never consciously departed from it, and I hope you will consider me entitled to an honorable discharge. I have the permission of his excellency the governor-general to inform you of my retirement in the immediate future."

The prime minister then expressed his gratitude to his colleagues and to his supporters in Parliament. The situation, he declared, was full of cheer; the position of the Government was steadily strengthened until today the party was more united, vigorous and determined than ever before. There was plenty of material within the party for the formation of a new administration. The party had suffered from lack of necessary work and reasonable activity outside the walls of Parliament. "You must not depend solely upon ministers for this work," Sir Robert warned his followers. "The legislative and administrative work imposed upon them is almost overwhelming."

Fine Working Majority. "We have a fine working majority in Parliament," he continued, "we have a good cause and a good policy; we have magnificent ability, energy and debating power in our ranks. There should be no difficulty in carrying on the Government. All that is essential is to stand together in the future as in the past."

As to the Government's policy, he said, it had been accepted. Its articulation would doubtless raise questions which could not be anticipated, but they could not be more than questions desired the adoption or fulfillment of a policy which would destroy the industries of this country or which would reduce its laboring population to the conditions which prevailed in some other countries. Living conditions of a just and decent character must be maintained.

Need of Unity. Sir Robert then referred briefly to the policy of the Government as laid down in the statement of policy submitted by him, and to the need of unity in carrying out this policy as laid down.

Dealing with the National Railway system, Sir Robert stated that it never had been a political football. Its management should be unhampered by direct interference from either Government or Parliament.

"Above all," he said, "there must never be any attempt to make our railway system a political machine or to use it as an agency in political contests."

In conclusion, the prime minister said: "I hope you all know me well enough to believe that I have spoken with perfect sincerity as to the reasons which enforce my resignation. These words of farewell have not been rendered without a heart-wrench."

GALT BUILDING PERMITS SHOW INCREASE VALUATION

GALT, July 2.—Fire Chief J. E. Keyes has issued during 1920, 63 building permits valued at \$163,380, compared with 79 with a value of \$138,220 for the same period of 1919, an increase of \$25,160. During the past month twelve permits, valued at \$25,750, were issued, including six for dwellings and two for stores.

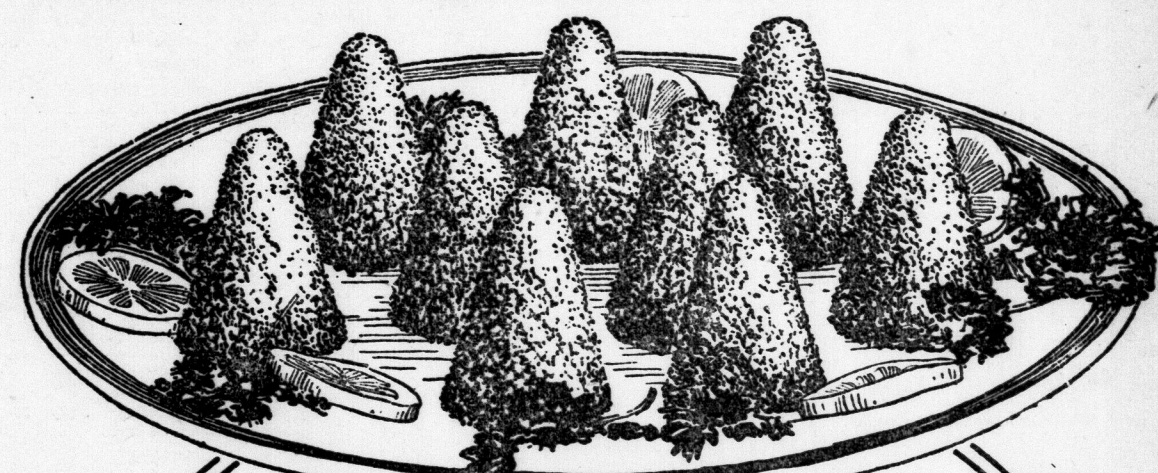

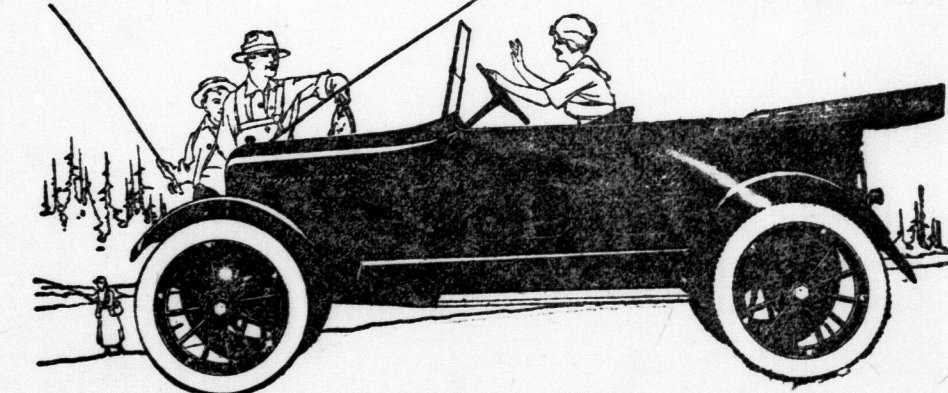
