association under the auspices of syndicalist leaders and will demand that the landed proprietors fix an acceptable yearly rental system, with an opportunity for the farmers to buy their farms at the expiration of their rental

farms at the expiration of their rental period. If the proprietors refuse, the farmers say they will refuse either to share their products with the proprietors or to pay them in currency.

They call attention to the fact that the public would be affected considerably for the good if the present tenantry system were abolished, as thousands of animals which are now delivered to a few proprietors would be available for purchase by the general public. Especially in the region of Cosse do the proprietors demand half the animals raised on the farms, while their levy on the grain and fruit produced often amounts to as much as three-fourths

on the grain and fruit produced often amounts to as much as three-fourths of the total crop.

In some sections the proprietors have furnished their tenants with modern farm implements, but where they have done this it was declared they have extorted another ten per cent of the farm profits in payment for the implements.




