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ATTITUDE OF ALLIANCE ON SUNDAY ICE CREAM

Sabbath Observance Secretary Ex-pounds Its Policy—Annual Conventions.

Rev. T. Albert Moore, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, returned to the city yesterday. Speaking to the World in regard to the sale of ice cream and soft beverages on Sundays, Mr. Moore said: "The alliance has never instituted any prosecutions in Toronto. It has not been necessary. The alliance, however, enforces the Lord's Day Act by the city police. Its attitude in regard to the sale of ice cream at other times is not in the least less strict. A violation of the law, and because its indiscriminate sale would entail unnecessary Sunday work on at least 2000 people in Toronto.

Secretary Moore said he noticed an editorial in The World on the prosecution of 11 persons on charges of selling ice cream on Sunday, and one person for selling liquor at Port Stanley. There was no discrimination in that against the ice cream dealers. The aim of the Lord's Day Alliance was to abolish as far as possible, unnecessary Sunday labor.

The annual conventions of the provincial Lord's Day Alliance were announced yesterday. They will all be attended by Secretary Moore. The dates are Prince Edward Island, Nov. 1; Nova Scotia, Truro, Nov. 2; New Brunswick, St. John, or Moncton, Nov. 4; Quebec, at Montreal, Nov. 9; Ontario, at Toronto, Nov. 12; Manitoba, Winnipeg, Nov. 14; Saskatchewan, Regina, Nov. 18; Alberta, Edmonton, Nov. 22 or 23; British Columbia, Vancouver, Nov. 26.

OTTAWA SCHOOL TAX DISPUTE

Separate Board Will Sue City on a Peculiar Contention.

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—There is going to be trouble in Ottawa between the separate school board and the city over the question of school taxes.

A number of Catholics annually, by request to the assessors, have themselves put down as public school supporters, the public school rate being lower than the separate. This has been the practice for years without question, but the separate school board now claims that a separate school supporter, to change to the public schools, must formally notify the city clerk, which has never been done.

The separate school board will therefore sue the city to recover all back taxes transferred "by request." A large sum is involved, and it was announced today that the city will fight the case, which is one which will act as a precedent throughout the province.

AN OFFICIAL "CUSS" WORD

Waterville, Kansas, Decides to Permit "By Chawder" as Expletive.

WATERVILLE, Kan., Aug. 12.—"By chawder" is the official swear word in Waterville now. The people of this burg cannot use any cuss word stronger than that under pain of going to jail.

The street loafers, it was charged, became so profane that the women of the town hesitated about going out on the streets. They would rather stay at home than hear men using vile language.

The merchants felt the loss of the women's trade keenly and prevailed upon the city council to enact a law against swearing.

In obedience to the demand the council made it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine and imprisonment to swear within the city limits.

In order to help the cholic cussers out the council decided that the women should not be considered a swear word under the new law.

MONTREY, Mex., Aug. 12.—The Santa Catarina suffered from a disastrous overflow, returned to its banks today, leaving a scene of desolation and destruction in the instance of Monterey. At least 14 persons were drowned. At San Luisito, a suburb, more than 600 houses were swept away.

GOLD IN NORTH LAND

Reports of Rich Discoveries Along Line of T. & N. O.

Reports are in circulation of a discovery of gold at Night Hawk Lake, near Matheson, on the line of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. Knowledge of the discovery has been in the hands of the commission for some time, but only this last few days has it been noted in mining circles.

A. J. McGee, secretary-treasurer of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission, states that the extent of the deposits are at present unknown, but that a number of prospectors have gone into the country.

NO CHANGE FOR YOUNG TURKS

Will Not Be Able to Swing Turkey, Says Prof. Wicher.

"I don't think the Young Turks will be able to swing Turkey," said Rev. Prof. Wicher of the San Francisco Theological Seminary, who is spending a few weeks in Toronto on his return from a year spent in Palestine and the near east.

"Of course it would be the best thing if they could, but the fact is, Constantinople is not Turkey, and they can't control the forces opposed to reform in the country districts. I don't think down to enquire into the massacres at Adana. The only hope for the Young Turks is the utter lack of leaders in the Old Turk party."

ROBERTSON INJUNCTION OVER TILL SEPTEMBER

What Will Council Do With Respect to Land Outside the Twenty-Two Acres?

September 20 has been fixed as the date for the adjourned hearing of the argument on the injunction obtained by J. Ross Robertson, to prevent the city from disposing of property on the bay front to the National Iron Co. Chancellor Boyd will sit on the case.

The postponement was made by mutual consent, on the request of the city when the case came up before Justice Meredith yesterday. The council in some other form, Mr. Robertson must have time to secure a new writ. In the meantime the injunction stands.

James Bicknell, K.C., appeared for Mr. Robertson and Assistant City Solicitor Wm. Johnston, for the city.

Not Clear Yet.

The situation arising out of the proceedings to prevent the city from selling the Cherry-street property to the National Iron Co. has been by no means cleared by the postponement of the argument. The question to which no definite answer appears to be forthcoming is: what is the city council going to do in the meantime?

It was announced several days ago that a special meeting would be held to ratify a new transaction whereby the company would pay for the additional acreage, not understood to be in the justice when terms were agreed upon. Just before the meeting was held, the injunction was only granted with respect to the particular transaction made, but as Assistant City Solicitor Johnston stated yesterday afternoon, any new transaction which was not essentially different from the original one, might give the applicants ground for applying for a fresh injunction.

An Illegal Bonus.

The applicants, besides objecting to the sale of 27 acres when the block was understood to contain only 22 acres, argue that the city in undertaking to dredge a channel held out an illegal bonus to the company. The problem is clear: whether the city council can make another bargain which contains such a provision, pending the disposal of the injunction which cites that clause as one of the grounds for making the application. In the opinion of Mr. Johnston, the city should make an argument which steers clear of the provisions to which exception is taken in order to avoid legal pitfalls.

IMPROVEMENTS AT QUEENSTON

Niagara Historical Society Would Add to Park's Attractions.

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, Aug. 12.—(Special.) A feature of the annual gathering at Queenston Heights today was a strong speech by James Armstrong in favor of the proposed Laura Secord monument being a memorial hall, with room for a museum and library of interest to visitors.

There was unanimous endorsement of this idea, and many of those present urged that the time had come when the attractiveness of Queenston as a holiday resort should be improved by beautifying the reserve along the river bank, erecting pavilions for shelter and rest, and other ways making this historic spot attractive to the holiday travelers who at present are unprovided for.

Addresses on historical subjects were given by Alexander Fraser, M.A., provincial archivist; A. W. Wright, Rev. A. F. Macgregor, Rev. J. C. Garbutt and others. The meeting was a great success.

TARIFF SESSION'S COST.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—It is estimated that the cost of holding the special session of congress to pass the tariff bill was at least \$500,000. This does not include the increased expenditure in printing the bill in its various stages and the Payne law as finally enacted. Accurate information as to the additional expense incurred by the government printing office is not available, but it is estimated to be as much as \$300,000 or \$400,000.
