Corn Promises Well. Price Current (Cincinnati) says: With but few exceptions reports of the week but few exceptions reports of the week concerning growing corn support previous high promise for abundant yield, possibly exceeding record of any previous year. Weather decidedly for advancement of crop and only a few more weeks favorable weather will put crop past danger. Later, wheat threshing about completed; general results still satisfactory. Plowing progressing rapidly; reports indicate large acreage will be sown.

NOT ENOUGH HOGS.

Now it is a shortage in hogs which is being experienced in Ontario. While no big outcry is being raised by packers in this connection, it is a fact known to the trade that scarcely half of the supply of hogs required for packing for domestic purposes and for expert are now being received.

One packer with whom The World spoke explained that there was no other reason for the shortage than one of supply and demand, the home consumption being too great to admit of the usual export.

This packer also informed The World that it was doubtful at prices now ruling for Canadian hogs, whether a profitable export business could be done in bacon and other products.

Most of the packing houses are working short hours on this account, altho the smaller packing concerns requiring 300 or 400 hogs a week are more able to get their supply than the big houses whether use up from 3000 to 4000 hogs.

The price of hogs has advanced 25c in the last week, and if the demand continues, it is considered probable that prices will still further advance before the top has been reached.

'The one remedy,' remarked a live stock man, 'is for the farmer to get out and raise more hogs. He has been getting an excellent price for his output during the last two years and cannot make a mistake in increasing his supply on the farm for some time to come.'

The railways reported 156 carloads of live stock at the city yards for Wednesday and Thursday, consisting of 1960 cattle, 1565 hogs, 4929 sheep and lambs, and 312 calves.

Good cattle were scarce, but that did for common to medium light weights which sold readily, as there is a Cemand for cheaper beef.

Butchers.

Prime cattle, 1000 to 1100 lbs., sold at \$5.75 to \$6 per cwt., but there were few of them. only one load brought the latter price. Loads of good, \$5.20 to \$5.60; medium, \$5 to \$5.25; common, \$4.25 to \$4.75; cows, \$5 to \$5.25; canners, \$2. Murby & Wilson bought 200 cattle. 1 load of de-horned steers, 1045 lbs., at \$5.25; 1 load steers, 850 lbs., at \$4.85; several small lots, 750 to 850 lbs., at \$4.25 to \$4.75; good stockers at \$4.25 to \$4.50; common stockers, \$3.50 to \$4.

Milkers and Springers.

There was a fair delivery of good milkers, which met a steady to strong market at prices ranging from \$40 up to \$78 each. Medium cows sold at \$30 to \$37 each, and inferior as low as \$25.

Veal Calves. Over 300 calves met as strong a market as ever, all being readily sold at prices ranging from \$3.50 to \$7.75, and a few at \$8 and a trifle over, in one or two instances.
