## S. A. STAFF CHIEF IN TORONTO TODAY

Commissioner T. Henry Howard Visits Canada for Annual - Congress.

#### TO CONDUCT MEETINGS

Under General Booth Visitor Has Oversight of Entire Organization.

Commissioner T. Henry Howard, the

chief of the Salvation Army Staff, who will arrive in Toronto today from London, England, is visiting Canada for the purpose of conducting the annual congress at Toronto and Winnipeg. Under the general, he has oversight of the entire Salvation Army and some idea of the magnitude of his sibilities may be gathered from the fact that the Salvation Army operates in 60 countries and colonies; preaches the gospel in 39 languages; has nearly 10,000 corps and societies, with 1173 social institutions for the reiled of the poor and those in distress The whole is run by 17,000 officers and

6500 employes.
