

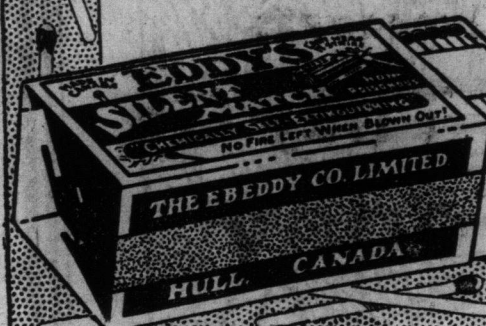

WILDE VS. MASON NEXT MONTH

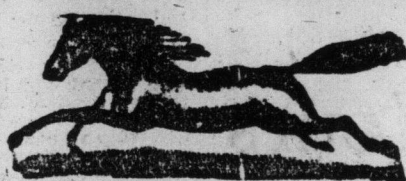

JUNO SHOWED REAL RACING OVER ICE

Nat Ray's Pacer Repeats in Straight Heats at Mt. Clemens on Fourth Day.

Mount Clemens, Mich., Jan. 30.—The fourth day's racing at Clinton View Park, Mount Clemens, was staged under much colder weather conditions, with a strong wind blowing down the back stretch, making fast time out of the question, but with a good crowd in attendance and plenty of warm accommodation for the spectators.

The 2:15 pace was the first on the program, with the mare, Juno, that won an event earlier in the week, as favorite, and while she won the event she was hard driven in two heats by Baba Yaga and Dr. Harvey. Juno has all the earmarks of a very high-class performer, and, in the hands of Nat Ray, showed what a real performer over the ice is.

In the 2:10 pacing, Frisch was installed favorite, and managed to win the two necessary heats to be declared winner of the event, although he was somewhat tired in the final and finished third to Pat Pointer.

Saturday's card will consist of the 2:27 trot and named pace, with good fields, and promises to afford an afternoon of racing. The racing week's events will open on Monday afternoon, with the 2:15 and 2:30 paces.
