LET THE QUESTION STAND.

If the city council cannot do better than select the Perkins property for a site for the Carnegie Library, it should do nothing. The council has shown its total unfitness to deal with the question by wasting 11 months in a vain endeavor to agree upon a site. What could not be accomplished in 11 months cannot be properly disposed of in a few days, and the present city council owes fit to the citizens to leave the question of the selection of a site for the Carnegie Library severely alone. The proposal to acquire the property at the corner of College and St. George-streets is nothing more or less than an effort to preserve the reputation of a dying council. The council is, no doubt, anxious to demonstrate its ability to settle an important civic question which has baffled it for nearly a year.

In this feature of the situation the public is not interested. It wants the question disposed of, but there is a limit to the cost which it is willing to pay for the termination of the farce of selecting a library site, Quite as important as the library itself is its accessibility to the public and to plant it at the corner of College and St. George-streets is to minimize its value to the great majority of the citizens of Toronto. The place for the library is down town, where it will be within easy reach of 75 per cent. of the citizens of Toronto during every hour of the working day.
