Chicago, Oct. 7.—The base ball season of both major leagues ended today with games at Chicago. St. Louis and Cincinnati in that organization easily. Taking the lead early in June, and holding it to the end, it established a new major league record for number of games won. Of the one hundred and fifty games played by the team, 118 were victories.

Halifax, Oct. 7.—(Special).—The Rugby football league games opened on Saturday with a match between the Wanderers and Dalhousie, which the college won 9 to 3. The Wanderers play showed lack of team work and Dalhousie was poor in kicking.

The junior league also opened with contests between the Wanderers and Dalhousie, the latter winning 14 to 0. Eiderick, a Sydney man, played on the half-back line for Dalhousie and gave a specially excellent account of himself.

The St. John City Rifle Club held their weekly match on the local rifle range Saturday afternoon. There was good attendance. The prize winners were:

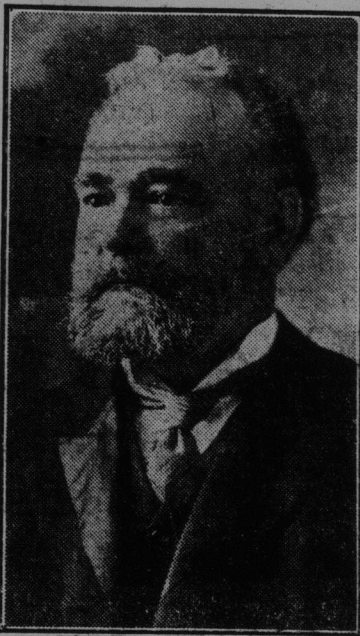

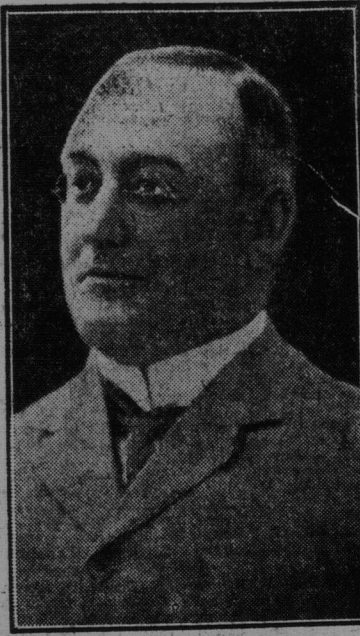
CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS

Hon. L. J. Tweedie, Premier of New Brunswick.



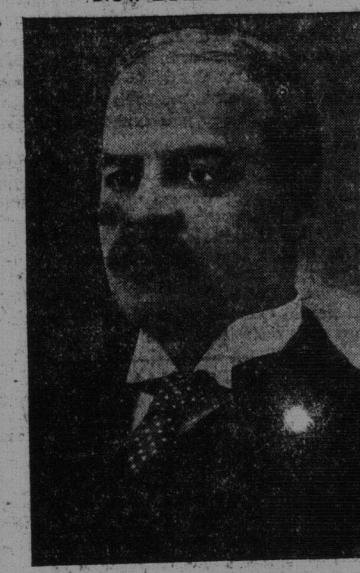
Hon. Geo. H. Murray, Premier of Nova Scotia.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Premier Tweedie arrived here by the Intercolonial this evening in company with the minister of railways. They were joined by Attorney General Pugsley and proceeded to Ottawa tonight, to take part in the conference between the representatives of the provinces and the dominion, which opens tomorrow.

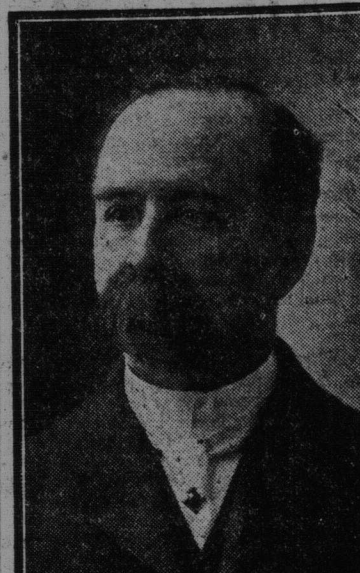
Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The provincial conference, which meets here tomorrow, is an outcome of a meeting which the provincial premiers had in Ottawa three years ago, when they had certain demands for increased subsidies before the Canadian government. Upon that occasion all the provinces were represented. They were then seven in number, now they are nine.

The principal question to be discussed is increased subsidies from the federal authorities. Early in the present year Sir Wilfrid Laurier received from the premiers of all the provinces, except of course, Saskatchewan and Alberta, identical letters setting forth the demand for increased provincial subsidies from the dominion treasury. This joint memorial was drafted by Mr. Gouin, the premier of Quebec, and proposed at length arguments in support of the demand for an increase of the annual federal payments to the provinces.

In 1887 there was an inter-provincial conference held in Quebec. It dealt with a variety of matters affecting the dominion and the provinces, and recommended the provinces were controlled by the Liberal party, while Sir John Macdonald and the Conservatives reigned at Ottawa. There was conflict between the dominion and some of the provinces, particularly Ontario, in regard to the question of provincial rights. It was maintained that Sir John was pursuing a policy of centralization and infringing on the rights of the provinces. At all events the dominion refused to take any part in the conference. A demand was, of course, made upon that occasion for an increase in the provincial subsidies.

ESCAPED ON
A LIFE RAFT

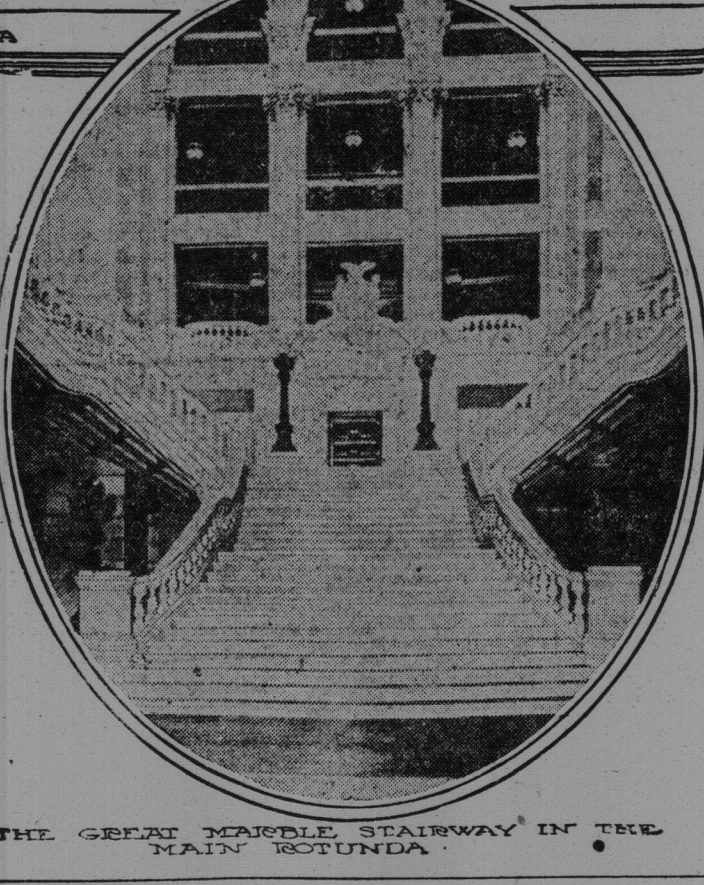
Two Prisoners From Deer Island Prison Were Very Nerr to Death.

Boston, Oct. 7.—With a handkerchief fluttering as a signal of distress, Charles Jones, alias Pilger, and Herbert J. Hanson were picked up today in Boston harbor off the Graves, where they were drifting out to sea on an old raft upon which they had made their escape from Deer Island.

Their signal was seen by the captain of the pilot boat Louise, who took the men aboard and landed them at Boston light, from which point they were returned to Deer Island by the police boat.

The two men who were serving two and three years respectively for larceny, were engaged Saturday with other prisoners, in working about the island and hid themselves in one of the outbuildings when the others were returned to their cells.

Early Sunday morning they loosened an old raft that had been hidden on an unfrequented part of the island and upon which they set out for liberty. They were unable to steer the raft and the high wind was rapidly taking them out into open water when they were discovered.
