LONGBOAT'S CAREER.

The winner of the Boston Marathon, who finished in such sensational time for the twenty-five mile race over roads on Friday last, is a full-blooded Indian, of the Onondaga tribe, the Shoshone, and comes from the Caledonia Reserve in the Niagara Peninsula. Only twenty years of age, Longboat is 5 feet 11 inches in height and weighs 145 lbs. He has all the characteristic physical peculiarities of his race. His frame is loosely knit and he appears to have all the qualities which go to make up a successful long distance runner. The dogged determination needed to carry a runner through a long grueling race like that of yesterday is well shown in the heavy jaw. His action is not pretty, according to lights of the modern track athlete, but it is effective. He takes long, loose, shambling strides, and while he does not appear to be making any great efforts, appears, as a spectator put it, to be able to go on forever. Although it is claimed by people in Toronto that Longboat was found by Harry Rosenthal, his late manager, and had been employed for the private ends of the latter in country fairs of the west, for a couple of years past, it was not until Thanksgiving Day, 1899 that he really came into prominence, when he won the road race of the Hamilton Herald, covering the nineteen miles in 1 hour and 40 minutes. His next big race was the Ward Marathon, an event of fifty-five miles, held in Toronto on October 28 last. The Indian finished first, in a field of sixty, in 1:31:10.25, which gives an average of a mile in slightly more than six minutes and with the going heavy over muddy roads at that.

Following this race the Indian took up his abode in Toronto and went into active training under the direction of Harry Rosenthal.

On Christmas Day the Indian entered in the ten-mile annual Christmas Day race in Hamilton, winning in the last time of 54.32, against twenty-two contestants, three minutes below the record.

The record effort of the Onondaga man was a three-mile matched race against Bonham, the New York crack, at the 74th Regiment indoor games at Buffalo. Owing to his never having run an indoor race before, and conditions being much against him, he lost, but not without forcing Bonham to lower his own world's record of 14.48, and setting up a new record of 14.42.5.

On Good Friday the Indian entered the two and a half-mile annual race of the West End Y. M. C. A., to which club he had transferred his allegiance. The Indian once again made home first, lowering the record by twelve seconds, running in mud all the way.

On Saturday, April 13, in a five mile race against the world's record, in the Garrison athletic games, at the Armories, the Indian could only do the course in 27.22, the record being 26.01, poor pace makers, the small track, the dust and smoke hindering him.

NEW WORLD'S RECORD!

PRINCETOWN, N. J., April 21.—A world's record was broken by Leo Talbot, the Meersburg academy boy, at the intercollegiate games held yesterday. He hurled the 12 lb. shot 109 ft. 9 in., bettering the record established by Tom Shevlin six years ago by three feet. Talbot also won the shot put and incidentally broke John R. DeWitt's intercollegiate record for the 12 lb. contest by over a foot. He put the missile 49 ft. 8 in.

SWIMMING

A NEW SWIMMING RECORD.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 23.—Charles M. Daniels of the N. Y. Athletic Club tonight, in the tank of the East Liberty Baths clipped three-fifths of a second from the world's record swimming record, covering the distance in 43.25. The record was made in competition, Guy M. Daily, of Pittsburgh, and two New York swimmers participating.

When the toast list was reached the president proposed the toast of the King, which was drunk to the strains of the national anthem.

The secretary then read a number of telegrams conveying fraternal greetings from other branches of the society in Canada, also from London (Eng), and New York.

Dr. G. A. B. Addy proposed the toast of the Hon. H. Noakes, late Premier of the Province. He referred to the death of the late lieutenant governor, congratulated Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie on his appointment and trusted he would soon move government house and himself to St. John.

Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie spoke of the Hon. H. Noakes as one of the most popular and statesmanlike governors the dominion ever had. He felt sure the winter part of his visit to England last summer and a visit here, in July or August, speaking for himself, he was so recently out of politics that it was still a strange scene to see him in the morning and find that he had committed no offence or indulged in a conspiracy. Even his friends, he said, would not have believed it. (Laughter.) He congratulated the society on their position and regretted other societies in the country were not kept up. They were a national and patriotic society and the dominion. Fifty years ago no one would have dreamed of the premises of the society taking in the premises of the society.

Dr. Bridges, speaking last night of his refusal to grant the request of President Sturdee, said no insult was intended St. George's society.

Dr. Bridges further said he had written a courteous letter to Col. Sturdee explaining the position of the board in the matter.
