

My own sym-



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pathies are, I think, more with the Western Indians than with these halfcivilized natives of Ontario. Sometimes too, I think, that for the sake of my growing family, and especially on account of my wife, who is in enfeebled health, that I ought to be withdrawing altogether from the Indian field, and seeking work in some other sphere. But these things, happily for us, are not for ourselves to decide. There is a hand that rules above, and orders for us our destinies. By that hand only do I wish to be guided, and to engage only in such work as it may be the will of the Almighty for me to engage in.
