New York, March 15-Representatives of the four railroad brotherhoods announced at 6.15 o'clock, after rejecting a counter-proposition made by the railroads, that a general railroad strike would begin at 6 o'clock Saturday night. The brotherhoods presented to the conference of railroad managers a demand with problems arising out of the war.


