ANOTHER PLOT TO BLOW UP LINERS UNEARTHED

New York, Oct. 25.—Details of a plot to hamper the shipment of munitions of war to the Allies by placing clock-work bombs on the rudders or propellers of ships, so timed that the ships would be disabled on their way across the Atlantic, were disclosed today in the confession of one of five men charged in a complaint filed with the United States commissioner with conspiracy to violate a federal statute.

Following upon the confession of Robert Fay, a lieutenant of the 16th Saxony Infantry, who admitted that he came to this country last April through an agreement with the German Secret Service to blow up or delay steamers laden with war supplies for the Allies, William J. Flynn, chief of the Secret Service, tonight filed before United States Commissioner Houghton, a complaint in which, not only Fay, but four other men are charged with promoting the conspir-

acy. The hearing on the federal charge was set for November 4.

FIRING SQUAD WOULD NOT KILL MISS GAVELL

Why Officer Had to Use Revolver—Similar Experience in Case of French Woman

Amsterdam, Oct. 26.—(Despatch to London Daily Mail)—The "Telegraaf" states that when the Germans executed the French woman, Miss Louise Fernay at Liege a fortnight ago, the firing party purposely aimed low and she was hit in the legs. An officer then shot her through the head with his revolver. The "Telegraaf" says the same thing happened in Miss Gavell's case. She was fired at by a party of twelve, but only one bullet touched her and did not hit her. The officer then shot her through the head with his revolver. MILITARY HONORS TO HEROIC WOMEN

French Cross Awarded to Nurses Who Remained at Posts Under Fire—Faced Danger Calmly

Paris, Oct. 26.—The military cross, with commendation in army orders, has been conferred on a long list of heroic women who, as nurses, stayed at their posts at Compiègne, Senlis and Villers-Cotterêts, some during the German occupation and all under fire. Among them are two women belonging to the French aristocracy, Baroness Pain and Countess Fillet Will. The baroness was at Chateau Compiègne when it was occupied by the Germans, and, in the words of an army order, "faced difficulties of every kind with calmness, dignity and constant readiness for all eventualities and constantly encouraging the staff." The Countess Fillet-Will returned to Compiègne after accompanying British wounded soldiers to Rouen, to find the Germans in occupation, but remained her duties there until the town was liberated. DELIGHTFUL PLAY IS OPERA HOUSE BILL

The Girl From Out Yonder—Whole-some Story of New England Coast

A quaint story of the New England coast, with the scenes prettily set in a little fishing village and the characters for the most part the kind-hearted, old-fashioned folk to be found in such a place, with just enough of the city life representation to afford a contrast being made, was that portrayed last night in the Opera House by the Partello Players, entitled "The Girl From Out Yonder." The play was well received.

The company acquired themselves with success in the piece. As "Flotsam," a waltz cast up by the sea, and known as "The Girl From Out Yonder," Miss Alice Kennedy added to the laurels she has already gained since coming here, and was popular and lovable throughout. Adopted by Captain Barton, who dwelt in the little village at Terry's Harbor, Flotsam grew to girlhood and womanhood and became devotedly attached to the people of the village, and her foster father. The part of the latter was taken exceptionally well by R. E. Johnson under whose direction the piece was presented.

In what was required of him in the role of Edward Elmer, a successful and heroic young contractor, Ralph W. Chambers made a pleasing impression, and he and Miss Kennedy in their love scenes were most likeable. Norman Houston as Hubert Hughes, a young society man from New York, carried the part with his usual cleverness. The various other roles were capably handled—Miss Lyons as Mrs. Elmer, aunt of Edward; Miss Mauer as Clarice Stapleton, society girl; Mr. Dugan, as an "old salt"; Miss Johnson as the housekeeper for Capt. Barton; Mr. May, as Joey, a young fisherman; Mr. Sullivan as waiter, and Mr. Kast as an officer. All were faithful portrayals giving a strong tone of burlesque life to the unfolding of the story of "The Girl From Out Yonder."

The play is in four acts and some of the settings are particularly attractive, the scene in the second act being especially striking, showing the beauty of the island on which is located the Great Reef Lighthouse. Between acts a vaudeville specialty by Avery & Williams was popularly received.
