Heavy Turnover Of Oil Stocks Is a Feature

SOME RAILS CLIMB

Spanish River Again in Lead- ship On The Montreal Market

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Rising prices characterized the opening of today's stock market, which was featured by a heavy turnover of the oil stocks. Blocks of 4000 shares each of Standard Oil of New Jersey and Phillips Petroleum changed hands at fractional advances. Large transactions also took place in New York Central and American Locomotive at higher prices. United States Steel opened unchanged at yesterday's high of 125 1/8.

MONTREAL, Jan. 13.—Trading was not very brisk at the opening of today's stock market and most of the few price changes were of a fractional nature.

Spanish River again assumed leadership rising another half point to 111 1/4 but the other received little attention. Attila, which is being mentioned with Spanish in connection with the imminent amalgamation appearing only in a small lot transaction unchanged at 66. Next to Spanish River in activity came Atlantic Sugar, up 1/8 at 20 1/2. The weak spot was Detroit Railway, which fell off two to 27. Montreal Power, Lake of Woods and Mackay sold the same at 160 1/2, 185 and 117 1/2 respectively. The balance of the list was quiet.

**NEW COMMISSIONER
OF PROVINCIAL BANK**

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Provincial Bank of Canada, Toronto, Jan. 12, Mr. L. C. Victoriano, was appointed member of the commissioners-censors of the bank to fill the vacancy created by the death of J. A. Richard.

Mr. Victoriano is a well-known personality in financial and industrial circles, more particularly in the Eastern Townships.

The progressive little town of Victoriaville can rightly claim him as one of its sons and as the real promoter of the industrial developments which have been so material in the progress of the town in recent years.

Mr. Victoriano was appointed to the local assembly for Athabaska from 1900 to 1910, and in 1921 was appointed legislative council for the District of Kennebec, following the death of J. A. Richard.

USE HELIUM GAS

Experiments to Lessen Burdens of Deep Sea Divers Have Proved Successful.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(United Press).—Helium gas which heretofore has been used exclusively "up in the air" to inflate airships, may soon be put to work underground and down deep in the seas.

Out of experiments now being conducted by scientists in various universities throughout the country, Navy Department experts believe, the non-inflammable gas may in the future also be employed to lessen the burdens of deep-sea divers and tunnel workers.

LECTURES ON BIBLE

Evangelist E. D. Lamont Begins Series in Charlotte Street Hall.

Evangelist E. D. Lamont has begun a ten weeks' Bible lecture campaign in Paradise Hall, Charlotte street. A strong address was given on Sunday evening on the inspiration of the Bible and a large and interested congregation attended. Speaking from Eph. 2:19-20, the speaker said that Jesus Christ was the chief cornerstone or foundation for the writings of both the apostles and prophets. There is nothing, he said, that man wrote the mind of the inspiration of the Bible as did the reading of the Bible itself. As a guide the Bible was without a rival. It gave a calm peace in believing, and a firm hope of the future. It solved the great problem of life and destiny, and inspired to a life of purity, patience and good doing. It filled the heart with love and a desire to do good to others. Some said that man wrote the Bible. If so, why did not man write as good a book today? He said that man might write a true book, but only God, the source of life, could write a living book. Mr. Lamont will continue his meetings during the week as announced. His next Sunday night lecture will be on "The Sure Word of Prophecy."

UPSET TRADITION

Court Order Prohibiting Indian Wine Manufacture Hits Papago Tribes.

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 13.—(United Press).—A court order prohibiting the manufacture of wine by the Papago tribes has upset the tradition of the Papagos, for it is their custom to make wine from the agave plant. The order was issued by the federal court at Tucson. The Papagos have been making wine for centuries and it is a part of their culture. The order was issued to protect the health of the Indians, but it has caused much distress among the tribes.

NO BUSINESS SHORT CUT SAYS MORGAN

Great Financier Makes Declaration in Address to N. Y. Bankers.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—"There are no safe short cuts in piloting a business or a ship," J. P. Morgan, known as the world's greatest financier, made this as one of the strongest points of his first public address. Morgan made this address at a dinner of New York bankers tonight which was also attended by two other big American financiers, George F. Baker and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon.

"Where I required to state an ethical code for our business," said the head of the house of Morgan, "I would say the first rule should be never do something you do not approve of in order more quickly to accomplish something that you do approve of. There are no short cuts in piloting a business or a ship."

As he named each player who had the puck, the fans could follow them battle back and forth. PROVIDA, Official Russian Communist Newspaper, Has Had Rapid Growth.

MOSCOW, Jan. 13.—(United Press).—"Pravda," the official organ of the Russian communist party, has just celebrated its achievement of a circulation of a half a million daily.

The anniversary number recalled the paper's birth in Leningrad—then Petersburg—in 1912, when its modest output of 30,000 copies was suddenly suppressed by edict of the Czar's government. It continued to appear illegally, but a "newsie" discovered selling "Pravda," or a revolutionary laborer seen buying it, was promptly trundled off to prison.

3,000 STILL CONFISCATED.

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—More than 3,000 stills recently were confiscated by Federal prohibition agents in a series of raids covering the Maxwell street market. Twenty-five hundred hydrometers were also taken and four persons were arrested. The stills and other devices were on open sale in six shops bordering the market. The raids followed sixty days of investigation by the Government in which nearly \$6,000 was spent in procuring evidence.
