

OLD LANDMARKS OF QUEBEC TO BE PRESERVED

Conservation Commission will
be Created.

Mr. David Prepares Bill—
Dominion and Municipal-
ities will be Co-operated
With.

Quebec, Feb. 7.—The Province of Quebec abounds in places, spots and landmarks of historic interest, it being the oldest province in Canada, and the place where two great civilizations meet and mix. Hon. Athanasius David, provincial secretary, has this in mind apparently in the bill which he intends to introduce this season to create a conservation commission. The purpose of this commission, the name of which is not defined, is not to deal with natural resources, but to preserve to future generations the old landmarks in the province.

The Commission will be given certain spending and other powers. Its task will be to see that old church buildings, some old windmills now falling into decay, and old forts are preserved, and, if need be, restored so that future generations may be able to see something of what New France was before the conquest.

It will co-operate with municipalities, and also with the Federal Government in a measure. The Federal Government has already done something to preserve landmarks, in Quebec, such as, for example, the preservation of the old fort at Chambly, where there is a guardian all the time, even though the walls are tumbling. There are many old churches built long before 1759, the date of the battle of the Plains of Abraham. Many of them have been renovated, built over, but structures succeeding to the old styles of architecture then in vogue, but it is not of these that Hon. Mr. David thinks so much as they did 180 years ago, and which will tumble into ruins soon, or be replaced on the same site, if something is not done to maintain them.

Ultimately it is very possible that this conservation commission will have wide powers. Hon. Mr. David has made it known that he aims to establish a museum for the province. He has for the past three years been buying pictures by Quebec artists, which now hang in the offices of the Ministers in the legislative buildings here, waiting to be transferred to their ultimate home, which will be a provincial gallery in a building where there will be stored things of interest to the province. This building will be also a great literary centre for the province. Undoubtedly, the people in charge will be men who have merited some claim of recognition for literary and artistic work, and from it will radiate the literary light, which will have much to do with the annual competitions for literature, the bill for which Hon. Mr. David has introduced only a few days ago.

BIG CANADIAN "MOVIE" COMPANY

Ten Units Operating This
Summer is Announcement.

Each Under Provincial Charter—To Place Canadian
Life Before the World is
the Object.

Toronto, Feb. 7.—A gigantic all-Canada motion picture corporation is in the making. Ernest Shipman, a producer of Canadian pictures, who formed a Canadian Photoplay, Ltd., with an Alberta charter, three years ago, is authority for the statement that the coming summer will see ten different motion picture production units operating under provincial charters in Canada. These units are already operating—Calgary and Winnipeg—while in Ottawa, Kingston, Toronto and Vancouver other units are in process of actual organization. In addition some fourteen cities have made application to be included in the list. "These ten units," stated Mr. Shipman yesterday, "will be controlled by one parent body whose aim will be to place the literature and life of Canada before the nations of the world through the medium of the screen."

Incidentally, this centralizing of the Canadian motion picture industry will effect a tremendous saving. When Mr. Shipman produced Oliver Curwood's story "Back to God's Country" in Alberta, the cost of the picture was \$185,000. Under the new centralizing scheme Mr. Shipman states the same picture would cost only \$70,000.

Asks Regrets Sent to Spain For Stand on Dry Iceland

Washington, Feb. 7.—Senator Jones, Republican, of Washington, introduced a resolution under which the Senate would express its profound regret at the "reported threats" of retaliation by Spain against Iceland because of the adoption of prohibition by the island.

The resolution states that current reports are to the effect that the Spanish Government has threatened the Government and the people of Iceland with prohibitory tariff duties on certain of the latter's products should the island maintain its stand on the liquor question. It was urged that "such threatened pressure" be frowned on by all Christian nations and peoples as a violation of the rights of self-determination.

CONSERVATIVES WERE HEAVIEST DEPOSIT LOSERS

Seventy Forfeited Money in
Federal Contest.

Liberals Scored Best in the
Failing to Qualify—None
in N. B.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—(Canadian Press).—The total number of candidates who lost their deposits in the last general election was 192, according to calculations based on the official figures issued today. Of this number, seventy were candidates in the interests of the Conservative party; forty-seven were Progressives; forty-three were Independents, and thirty-two were Liberals.

By provinces the number who lost their deposits is as follows: Quebec, seventy-two; Ontario, thirty-six; Saskatchewan, twenty-one; Alberta, nineteen; Manitoba, seventeen; Nova Scotia, eight; New Brunswick seven; British Columbia, seven; Prince Edward Island, four; and Yukon, one.

In the province of Quebec, thirty-four Conservative candidates who went to the polls lost their deposit, the remainder being made up of sixteen Progressives and twenty-two Independents. Ontario figures show that twelve Liberals, fifteen Progressives, three Conservatives and six Independents failed to obtain the necessary number of votes to retain their deposit.

No Liberals in N. B.
In Nova Scotia, six Progressives and two Conservatives lost out. In New Brunswick, four Progressives and three Conservatives went by. The four losers in Prince Edward Island were all Progressives.

Manitoba figures show that four Liberals, one Progressive, seven Conservatives and five Independents lost their money. Saskatchewan, seven Liberals, twelve Conservatives, two Independents; and Alberta, seven Liberals, nine Conservatives and three Independents. British Columbia, two Liberals, one Progressive and four Independents; and Yukon, one Independent.

A defeated candidate must obtain half of the total vote polled by successful candidate to retain his deposit.
