

## ATTACK STORE ATTENDANT AND TAKE DIAMONDS

Truss Jeweler's Son and Es-  
cape With Plunder Valued  
at \$20,000 in Montreal.

(Montreal Gazette, Saturday.)  
After attacking, gagging and binding  
George Appleby, Jr., the only attendant  
at the time in the store of Appleby &  
Company, jewellers, two robbers at 2:30  
o'clock yesterday afternoon stole di-  
amonds, gold rings and watches to the  
value of between \$15,000 and \$20,000.  
Either before commencing operations, or  
on leaving the office, room 605, Southern  
Building, 128 Bleury street, the robbers  
wedged in the glass of the locked door  
the laconic and misleading note, "Back  
in half an hour," and carrying their  
plunder in a stolen handbag left the  
building without attracting attention.  
Before entering the Appleby store the  
robbers had visited two other offices in  
the building, either with a view to  
plunder or to estimate the chances of the  
arrival of superior forces should the  
alarm be raised while they were at work,  
explaining their presence in these places  
by inquiring for a person not employed  
in either office.

It is believed by the police that the  
ground was looked over, and the chances  
of a successful coup estimated, two days  
ago, when a man and a woman—the lat-  
ter, according to a tenant, being "frigh-  
tfully masculine," visited the Appleby  
store, among others.  
That the work was done by experts  
is evidenced by the fact that only the

more valuable articles were taken, filled  
and plated with being strewn over the  
floor on which lay young Appleby  
trussed and shouting into the telephone,  
pulled from the desk, where his father  
entered the office held an hour later. No  
arrests have been reported by the police.  
Story of Hold-Up.

George Appleby, Jr., who was nursing  
a badly bruised right eye and nose, yes-  
terday afternoon gave the following ac-  
count of the assault and robbery:—"I  
was alone in the store at 2:30 o'clock.  
Two men entered and said they wanted  
to buy a clock. One was a tall man,  
heavily built and wearing a blue serge  
suit. The other was shorter and stout.  
He was a middle-aged man. I stepped  
out into the front of the store from be-  
hind the counter and one of the men  
pointed out a clock on one of the top  
shelves of the cabinet where they are  
kept near the store door. I raised my  
arms to reach the clock and suddenly  
I felt a revolver barrel in the small of  
my back. Leave your arms up like  
that," said one of the robbers. I turned,  
and one of the men struck me full be-  
tween the eyes with his fist. I was stun-  
ned for a moment, and before I could  
make another move they had gagged me  
with an old shirt and had tied my  
hands behind my back and, with the  
end of the rope, bound my ankles. They  
dragged me back of the counter and  
threw me behind the smaller safe, where  
I could hardly be seen by any one enter-  
ing the shop. Then they opened the two  
safes and selected a large quantity of  
goods. They took a handbag that was  
on a shelf and placed the articles in it.  
After they had left I dragged myself  
towards the telephone. I managed to  
get rid of the gag and I pulled the tele-  
phone off the desk. I got my car to the  
reducer and shouted into the instrument.  
I got no answer from the operator. Then  
my father came in and found me.

### Heard Shouts For Help.

George Appleby, sr., proprietor of the  
store, said: "I am usually in the store  
between 2:30 and 3 o'clock every day and  
usually I am alone and my assistant then  
goes to lunch and my son is out on the  
store's business. Today it happened  
that I had to go to the post office to re-  
ceive some registered parcels and the af-  
fair occurred during my absence. When  
I arrived shortly after three o'clock, I  
heard, as I stepped out of the elevator  
about some shouting and I thought  
that the sound came from my store, the  
door of which is directly opposite the  
elevator doors. Reaching my door, I  
was surprised to find a sign on it read-  
ing: "Back in half an hour." I heard  
more shouts and quickly unlocked the  
door. I found my son on the floor near  
a desk in rear of the counter. He was  
shouting for aid. I untied him and im-  
mediately called the police.

"I learned afterwards that the two  
handbags had visited the stores of Eaves  
Bro. on the floor below and that of  
Thomas Wright, of the Clothing Manu-  
facturers' Association of Montreal, right  
next door to my store, but I guess that  
there were too many men in both of  
these places for them and they worked  
around to my store, where they found  
only my son in the place. The descrip-  
tion of the two men given by my son  
is the same as that given by employees  
both at Wright's and Eaves' places. I  
understand that there was a meeting of  
some kind in the Clothing Manufacturers'  
Association's office and that someone  
there heard my son shouting, but no one  
realized it was for help that he was call-  
ing. No other persons seemed to have  
heard anything.

Wife of General Electric Official Dies  
Through Accident.

Montclair, N. J., July 25.—Mrs. Jennie  
C. Morrison, wife of George F. Morrison,

William M. Brien ascribed death to an  
accidental overdose of veronal which  
Mrs. Morrison was accustomed to tak-  
ing as a sedative.

shopping trip and, being tired, went to  
bed about 9:30 o'clock her daughter,

dition to exhaustion. Later Mrs. Mor-  
rison's condition became more alarming  
and the family physician was called. Be-  
fore his arrival Mrs. Morrison died.

## SAYS WORLD'S FATE IS IN GERMAN MARK

Oscar Crosby, Back from Eu-  
rope, Warns of Menace in  
Flood of Paper Money.

New York, July 25.—Among first  
cabin passengers who arrived from  
Havre on the French liner France was  
Oscar T. Crosby, who was assistant  
secretary of the treasury under Presi-  
dent Wilson, and had charge of the  
\$10,000,000 loan to the Allies. He  
has been on a tour of France and in  
many, and is returning to chairman of a  
"Round Table" conference on world  
conditions to be held at the meeting of  
the Institute of Politics at Williams-  
town, Mass., July 28. Speaking of the  
deflation of currency in Europe, Mr.  
Crosby said:—

"The German mark is the most seri-  
ous factor in world progress today. Its  
importance and the danger it represents  
cannot be overestimated. The fate of  
the world may be said to depend on the  
fate of the German mark. The flood of  
printing press money has burst the  
bounds of all reason and cannot be  
stopped. But it must be stopped, be-  
cause when credit becomes worthless there  
is nothing worth anything.  
"Much has been said of the commer-  
cial and industrial activity of the Ger-  
mans since the war. It is almost all  
true. But the Germans are spending  
their money as fast as they get it and  
are living from hand to mouth. Except  
a few fortunate individuals, no one is  
saving anything. The people are des-  
perate and facing starvation and no one  
can tell what will occur under such cir-  
cumstances.

"It is not altogether a result of the  
war. Even before 1914 the Germans had  
what they called 'credit money,' and the  
evil lesson that it would suffice has been  
their undoing."

Roland Boyden, the unofficial repre-  
sentative of the United States in the  
Allied Reparations Commission, re-  
turned on the France for a six weeks  
vacation after an absence of six years.  
He will go at once to Boston, then to  
Washington to make his report.

Captain George Thenuat, who for a  
time was in command of the yachtette  
Eccedille early in the war, also arrived  
on his way to Washington, as military  
attache to the French Embassy.

## OLYMPIC MAKES A NEW RECORD

Travels 27.81 Knots for Sev-  
eral Hours on Last Trip.

The White Star liner Olympic, on its  
last voyage from New York to Cher-  
bourg, maintained for several hours  
a speed of 27.81 knots an hour, which is  
a world record for a passenger liner.  
The best previous record was that  
made by the Mauretania on her voyage  
from New York to Cherbourg last April,  
when for several hours she maintained  
a speed of 27.5 knots.

The burst of speed made by the  
Olympic, according to a cable dispatch,  
was from Lands End, Cornwall, across  
the English Channel to Cherbourg, a dis-  
tance of about 100 miles. The weather  
was fine and the sea smooth, according  
to the master of the liner, Captain A. E.  
Hamblin, R. N. R., who succeeded  
Captain Sir Bertram Hayes, D. S. O.,  
when the latter went to the Majestic.

Since the Olympic was converted into  
an oil burner, she has been making  
improvements in her speed steadily, and  
her chief engineer, J. D. Thearle, had been  
confident that he would get the liner  
up to 28 knots, and, indeed, she had  
made 27.81 knots an hour. She arrived at  
Cherbourg at 5:30 p. m. Friday.

The Olympic's new record exceeds the  
best speed made by the Majestic on her  
maiden voyage, which was an average  
of 27.10 for five hours. When Captain  
Hamblin took the ship over from Cap-  
tain Sir Bertram Hayes he said jokingly  
that he was going to make a new record  
with her and it has been done.

The record for the Atlantic is 26.06  
knots average from New York to Queens-  
town. From New York to Cherbourg  
the record is 25.14 knots for the voyage.

## VALUE OF REVACCINATIONS.

Dutch Scientists Seek to Learn Duration  
of Immunity.

A special correspondent of The Jour-  
nal of the American Medical Association  
in the Netherlands writes that the com-  
mission appointed by the Netherlands  
Vereniging van Koepelkinderen to in-  
vestigate the subject of revaccinations,  
composed of D. A. de Jong, H.  
van de Berg and Y. Rodenhuis, con-  
sidered the following points: The suc-  
cess of the fight against smallpox de-  
pends on intensive revaccination, as re-  
sults show that in children the im-  
munity conferred by vaccination is lost  
after a certain length of time. But the  
importance of this loss of immunity is  
difficult to determine on account of the  
difference in interpretation of results of  
vaccinations.

The commission called attention to the  
course which vaccinations and revac-  
cinations pursue. In vaccination the  
specific reaction occurs earlier; it is  
abortive, with an extreme reaction; dif-  
ferent points of inoculation reach dif-  
ferent stages of development; the pro-  
cess is more superficial and there is no  
electric. The fact that public revac-  
cinations are examined, as a rule, one  
week later, makes it difficult to esti-  
mate the results obtained. In private  
practice subjects should be examined  
three or four days after revaccination,  
and very often recognized by certain  
signs. The commission describes and  
distinguishes three stages in which it is  
easy to recognize results of revaccina-  
tion. It concludes that a revaccination  
showing even a slight areola or inflam-  
mation, or which has left a small brown  
scab, should be considered as positive.

## ASK COURT TO GUARD JACKIE COOGAN'S EARNINGS

Parents Act to End Gossip That They  
Use Child Star's Earnings for Them-  
selves.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 25.—Jack  
Coogan and Lillian Coogan, parents of  
Jackie Coogan, child motion picture ac-  
tor, petitioned the superior court here  
to appoint Mrs. Coogan legal guardian of  
Jackie. The petitioners recited that  
they were conserving Jackie's earnings  
for him, although the law gives the par-  
ents control of the earnings of a minor,  
and that they wished to put the trust  
under the direction of the court.

The father said the petition was filed  
because he and Mrs. Coogan wished to  
quiet gossip that they were taking  
Jackie's earnings for their own benefit.  
The petition grants Jackie's "emancipa-  
tion," which means that his earnings are  
his own, and his parents, as guardians,  
will be required to conserve them and  
account to him when he comes of age.

## "EUSTON HEIR" IDENTIFIED.

Was Edward Eustace, Not of Titled  
English Family.

The mystery surrounding the identity  
of a man found dead in a furnished room  
at 19 Hicks street, Brooklyn, on July 12  
was cleared when Mrs. Amanda Doughty  
of 64 Oakland street, Red Bank, N. J.,  
visited the Kings county morgue and  
identified the body as that of her  
brother, Edward Eustace. The identi-  
fication disposes of reports that he was re-  
lated to the titled Euston family of  
England.

Mrs. Doughty said her brother was  
born in Albany, N. Y., and was sixty-  
two years old. His parents were John  
Eustace and Jane Dayton, both born in  
Ireland. Mrs. Doughty said she had not  
heard from him in many years. She  
added that he was eccentric and evinced  
a great dislike to letting persons know  
that he was of Irish ancestry.
