DEATH OF SOLDIER
Frank A. Muckler was Seriously Gassed in France.

After suffering for upwards of three years from the effects of gas poisoning received while on active service, Frank A. Muckler, of 81 Carleton street, died about 10 o'clock this morning at his home. He went overseas with the 116th battalion and was severely gassed while in France. He returned home in April 1919, and since that time had been a patient at the D. S. C. R. sanatorium at River Glade. He was in his thirty-second year and was a great favorite with all who knew him.

He leaves his wife, formerly Miss Katie Darrak, and one little girl, Mary, his parents, two brothers and one sister. The parents and sister are now living at Grand Falls.

COURT'S TRIBUTE TO LADY TILLEY

In the court case this morning the case of the King vs. Kennedy, McGuire and Nickerson was called. R. A. David, in behalf of L. P. D. Tilley, K.C., counsel for the defence, made application for an adjournment because of the death of Lady Tilley, his mother. His Honor Judge Armstrong in granting the adjournment spoke feelingly of the death of Lady Tilley, referring to her as having been the wife of a former lieutenant-governor of this province, active in all the good works in the city and province and in fact in many endeavors which were of great ability in promotion of works for the dominion wide. He said she was a leader in many organizations and showed life-giving ability in promotion of works for men who had not been permitted to testify of being disappointed because they had had no opportunity to talk. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defence.

George Durant was charged by his wife with non-support. Mrs. Durant testified that she had brought the defendant before the court on a previous occasion and he was allowed to go on the promise that he would do better. She had six children and she had to go to the neighbors for help. She testified that her husband drank rum and that he only worked when he had to. He had stopped her credit with the grocery last night. The defendant was remanded and the case postponed for further witness.

Gardiner and Ardous, charged with breaking and entering and stealing cloth, were brought before the court and again remanded.
