Outlook As To Line-Up Over Tariff

Ottawa, June 6.—The tariff rift in the Unionist camp is assuming definite proportions. Hon, T. A. Crerar's lead is being followed by about a score of the Western Liberal-Unionists

A definite alignment of the "Bolters" cannot, however, be determined until after Monday's caucus of the Westerners, when their future attitude towards the Government and Opposition will be carefully canvassed. At present, however, it would look as if some nineteen or twenty out of the lifty-four Western Unionists members will vote against the Government's tariff proposals. Whether or not they will move an amendment of their own along the lines of the platform adopted by the council of agriculture or combine with an Opposition amendment couched in general terms demanding a further downward revisin of the tariff, remains to be seen. In any event it would seem as if the Government could still count on a small majority to defeat the combined forces of Opposition and cross benchers.

The continuance of the Government in power for the balance of this session at least, is practically secure in as much as neither Opposition nor "Bolters" desire to precipitate an election at the present time and care will probably be taken that whenever this tariff issue is brought forward and in whatever form an amendment is offered that the vote for it will not outnumber the votes

Ottawa, June 6-Practically the whole day in the house was spent on discussion of a bill to create a purchasing commission. The commission is to continue the work carried on by the war purchasing commission and is to purchase all government supplies. There was somewhat extended criticism of the bill.

The motion for six months hoist was defeated by 56 to 19—a government majority of 37. John Best, J. A. Maharg and Dr. Michael Clark voted with the opposition.
