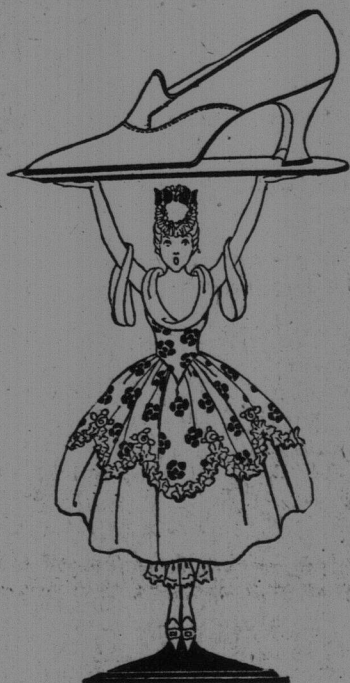

Peace Day Proclamation

Saturday next, July 19, having been proclaimed a Public Holiday throughout the British Empire, for the celebration of peace, the citizens of St. John are requested to observe it as such and to lend their aid to the civic authorities in order to secure its fitting observance.

The public is invited to assemble at King Square in the afternoon, when a programme of band music will be carried out from 2.30 to 3.30, followed by addresses by distinguished speakers—Governor Halsey, Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen, and Chief Justice McKeown.

At the close of the addresses the band programme will be resumed and continue until 6 p.m.

In the evening, beginning at 8 o'clock, there will be a band concert on King Square, followed by a display of fireworks, to which the public is invited.

As a further manifestation of joy over the conclusion of peace, it is requested that flags and bunting be displayed throughout the city on Peace Day and that at the hour of twelve o'clock noon (daylight time) the bells of the city make a joyful noise for a period of five minutes.

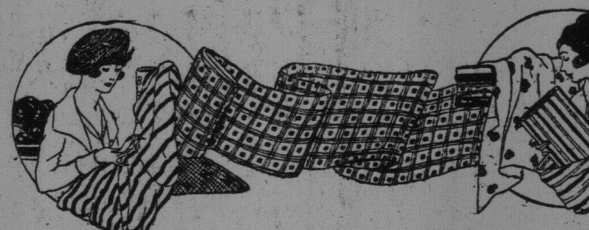

DOCTORS FIGHT DUEL WITH GERMS

Cause of Disease Basis of Contest Between Medical Men — Invite Illness

St. Paul, Minn., July 16.—To prove his theory that germs do not cause disease, Dr. H. A. Zittel, electrophysicist, of St. Paul, challenged Dr. H. W. Hill, executive officer of the Manitoba Health Association, to a duel to the death with germs. Dr. Hill accepted the challenge and the two will expose themselves to the most virulent of contagious diseases, including typhoid, smallpox and bubonic plague.

Dr. Zittel will use in his defense against germs only sanitation, pure air, and sanitary food and drink. Dr. Hill will expose himself after scientific inoculation and vaccination. The survivor is to be honorary palmer at the funeral of the victim, according to Dr. Zittel's challenge.

The challenge grew out of the acceptance by Dr. Hill of a similar challenge issued by Dr. J. B. Fraser of Toronto in an article, "Do Germs Cause Disease?" published in the Physical Culture Magazine. Dr. Zittel is an exponent of Dr. Fraser's theories and offered to substitute himself in Dr. Fraser's place in the duel. Dr. Hill was a bacteriologist in Boston from 1898 to 1903.

The minister of labor is requested to order the board of conciliation to resume its sittings, his constitutional right to order the same suspended being questioned, and the company is asked to take back all the former employees. Otherwise a strike vote of all unions is recommended. Union men are asked to boycott the present service on the electric railway and also the Ottawa Electric Light Company, which is headed by practically the same interests.

New London, Conn., July 16.—The strike of the trolley men employed by the Shore Line Electric Railway Company went into effect last midnight. The number of men out is about 600. They want higher wages.
