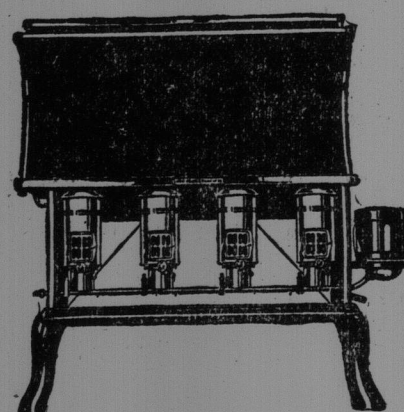

Eighteen deaths were reported to the board of health during the week: Pneumonia, four; heart disease, two; pulmonary tuberculosis, two; scalding, two; bronchitis, pneumonia, birth, acute alcoholism, broncho pneumonia, periculous anaemia, spinal meningitis, tuberculosis, peritonitis and sclerosis of spinal cord, one each.

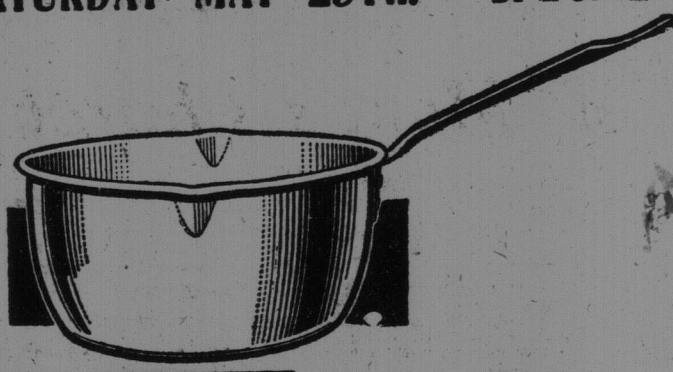

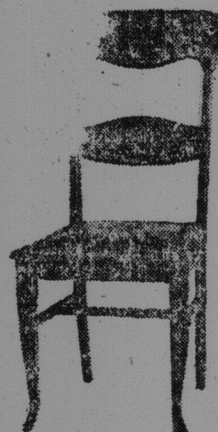

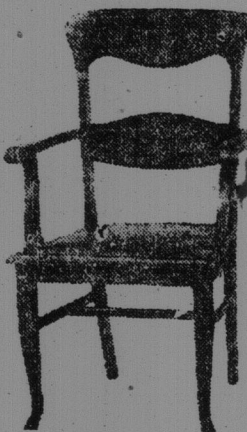
