BOSTON WINS
FOURTH GAMEScore Was Three to Two—Games
Now Stand Boston Three, Chi-
cago One

Fenway Park, Sept. 9.—Victory perched on the banners of the Boston Red Sox this afternoon, when they vanquished the Chicago National League champions by a score of 3 to 2. Over twenty thousand persons saw the highly exciting game played in which "Babe" Ruth's big black bat figured for the first time in the series. With two red tagged men on the bases passed by Tyler, when he became unsteady in the fourth inning, the "Babe" crashed into one of Tyler's shots and sent it to the far-away fence. When the ball got back to the diamond two Red Sox had need to cross the plate and the puffing Ruth seemed safely in hand for Boston until the eighth when Ruth lost control and with a couple of hits by the Cubs, the score was tied. Boston went into the lead again in their half of the eighth on a single, a passed ball and a hard leave of a sacrifice hit by Phil Douglas. Ruth went back again in the ninth and lashed, who was called in the box, stopped the Cubs. The series now stands, Boston Americans three, Chicago National one.

FANS CONFIDENT
BUT PLAYERS
MORE CAUTIOUSFifth Game in World's Series Will
Likely See Hendrix Against
Jones

Boston, Sept. 10.—Cheerful confidence prevails today in the camp of the Red Sox followers as they prepared to watch what they believed would be the final game of the world series.
Among the players however, there was no such assurance that the series would end today. The Cubs had lost none of their fighting spirit. The Red Sox, although naturally elated over their success thus far, kept in mind a world's series when the Boston American League champions found themselves in exactly the same position as was Chicago today, and yet won the title. That was in

1908. The Pittsburgh Nationals won three of the first four games and then the pioneer Red Sox went in and took four straight.
The weather was ideal for this afternoon's clash. Although there was an autumn chill in the air this morning, the bright sunshine bade fare to bring back summer-like conditions later in the day.
