QUARTETTE MAKING GREAT WINNINGS AT MONTE CARLO TABLES

Monte Carlo, Feb. 13.—While the social life of Monte Carlo goes on day after day without much variety, and the same people take dejeuner, tea and dinner with one another in the same places and in the same little sets, as much cannot be said of the gambling, which each day has surprises, pleasant or otherwise, in store for those interested in the luck of several very high players who are here just now.

Probably the most talked of persons in Monte Carlo these days are three men—a Frenchman, an American and an Englishman—and there is also one member of the fair sex who, for plucky and often lucky play, is no one who has been others. The Casino in the late afternoon and the Sporting Club in the evening are scenes of much interest and excitement when these four players occasionally meet at the same table, and the numbers literally disappear beneath the 100, chips, notes and gold.

Not infrequently when a favorite number turns up some 20,000, or 40,000, are paid out. A proof of the extent to which the bank was obliged to count out notes the other night is that more money was sent for three times, and within one hour there were only twelve spins.

There was an amusing scene at "rennet-urante" between the "chief de partie" and the French and Austrian players. Both fancied black, and each at the end of the table negligently dropped 12,000 franc notes upon the color of his choice. It is against the rules for two maximums to be played at once upon the same color, and in spite of the "chiefs" remonstrances neither of the players wished to lessen his stake.

At last the Austrian said—"I insist upon playing 12,000 francs, and if you won't let me play it on black I'll play it on red."

And back he did, and red turned up five times, with the result that instead of being out 111,000 francs he was 60,000 francs to the good.
