## MORMON PARTY IN ST. JOHN

### Band of 26 Missionaries on Their Way to Europe to Spread Their Doctrines

A party of twenty-six Mormon missionaries arrived in St. John last evening and will leave tomorrow morning on the steamer Victorian for Liverpool. They will spend the next two or three years in Europe, most of them in Great Britain and the others in Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and Germany. The party is under the leadership of Mr. Erickson, who has had previous experience in this work. With the exception of the leader and one or two others the rest of the party are all young men, twenty to twenty-two years of age who are in the missionary work for the first time after a couple of years in the training school at Salt Lake City. The young men are all from Utah, but from different parts of the state, and in accordance with the rule of the church of Latter Day Saints, are now visiting several of the best years of their life to the work of propagating their doctrines. This is done without any direct expense to the church, as those who have money pay their own way and the others either support themselves or are supported by their parents while they are abroad.

Speaking about the charges that have been made by George Q. Cannon, former Mormon elder, that polygamy is still practiced and is on the increase in Utah, one of the missionaries said this morning that the civil authorities had taken up the charge which was made against the Prophet Joseph Smith, the head of the church, but had been unable to prove its correctness. The missionaries did not preach this doctrine, he said, and if it was taught it was only in the inner circles of the church. Their work was one of evangelization, and not of immigration. They made no effort, he said, to induce converts to come to America, preferring that they should remain at home and help to spread the doctrines.

### OPEN DOOR AT HOSPITAL

Decision Does Away With Plan of Adding to the Staff

The commissioners of the General Public Hospital have decided to open the doors of the institution for all doctors who may be called to attend patients in the private wards, and this means the abandonment of another plan which had been decided upon at a recent meeting. Instead of complying with the request for the adoption of the open-door policy at that time the board decided to appoint eight additional assistants to the medical and surgical staff. The decision was not reached at that time without some difference of opinion and a motion was then made to open the doors to all physicians, but this was not carried.

The appointments of the eight new members of the staff were expected yesterday, but instead the commissioners changed their minds and adopted the new rule, that any patient in private ward may be attended by any doctor entitled to practice here.

It is understood that the difficulty experienced in selecting the eight men for the proposed appointments had something to do with the abandonment of that idea. The resolution of the commission covering the matter is as follows:— "That all legally qualified doctors in the city and county of St. John be permitted to treat patients in the private rooms of the hospital when such are available, under rules to be approved by the board of commissioners. This motion will be in effect as soon as the rules have been approved."




