Postmaster General Announces Plans Regarding Salary Question

OTHERS ALSO WILL GET OPPORTUNITY

Time of Meeting With Civil Servants Unknown by Hon. Chas. Murphy.

OTTAWA, May 13.—Hon. Charles Murphy, Postmaster General, today said that branches of the Postal Service had been notified that if postal employees were dissatisfied with their salaries, they were at liberty to make representations to a sub-committee of the cabinet here.

This action had been taken, said Mr. Murphy, in pursuance of a promise made by Hon. Charles Stewart, who was Acting Postmaster General at the time of the strike last summer, that postal employees who were dissatisfied with the salary revision, would be given an opportunity to state their grievances to a sub-committee of the cabinet.

This opportunity is extended to other branches of the civil service as well as the postal employees. The Postmaster General said that he did not know yet if there would be a meeting with the postal employees or if so when it would take place.

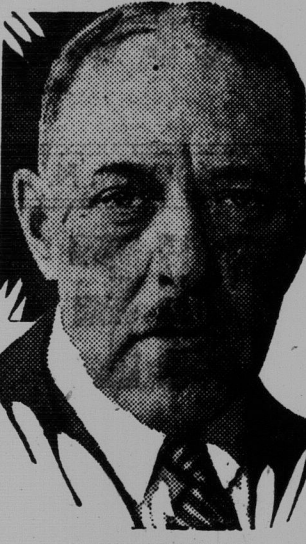

Majorca, largest of the islands that nestle in Spanish gulf of the Mediterranean, is a veritable compass. Almost perfectly square, its four corners point to the north, south, east, and west. Along its northwestern edge, toward Spain, is a mountain range, whose summits are always white. Snow covers the mountains in summer they gleam because they are of white marble. The great plain southeast of the olive trees, and grape vineyards and gardens and pasture lands. Palma, the capital, dates back to Carthaginian days when colonists from the African empire settled the island. It occupied it in the middle ages and based their practical campaigns on that port, until suppressed in 1229. Little remains to recall these early times, Spanish influence having predominated for centuries.

Along the southeastern shore of Majorca are some great stalactite caves, among the largest in Europe.

Hindenburg's Inauguration Utterances Create Good Impression.

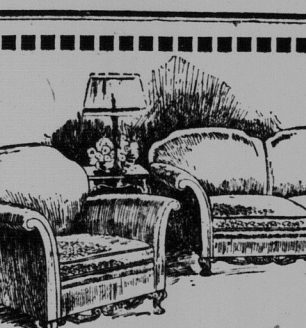
