Several more of the wounded boys of the 26th, including three St. John men, have written from English hospitals to Agent General Fred W. Sumner. The letters of the St. John boys follow:

Orpington, Kent, Sept. 22nd, 1916. Dear Mr. Sumner—Received your letter of the 21st today and was very pleased to hear from you. My right hand and wrist are "out of action" so I am trying to make use of my left, but am making a poor job of it. I am not wounded, but have rheumatism in my left hip and knee and in my both feet, and hand as I have mentioned. Am getting along fairly well. I went to France with the 6th Mounted Rifles eleven months ago. Shall be pleased to make your office my headquarters when I go on leave. My father's address is care C. P. R. office, West St. John.
