## MR. DISRAELI MADE QUEEN VICTORIA EMPRESS OF INDIA

**Circumstances Under Which  
Title Was First Bestowed  
on a British Sovereign—  
Was Some Objection At  
First.**

How many persons can recall the  
man who was instrumental in giving to  
the late Queen Victoria the title "Em-  
press of India," and the circumstances  
in which the designation was added to  
the royal name?

It was Disraeli, Lord Beaconsfield  
and the manner in which he fought  
down opposition and obtained what he  
worked for was characteristic of his meth-  
od of overcoming all obstacles. He was  
sovereign persons, but he made up his  
mind that he was going to be a power  
in the British government. His first  
speech in that historic chamber was a  
disposal of a bill. Perhaps the most  
of his personality may have had some-  
thing to do with the reception which  
was accorded to his initial remarks.

One of the chronicles of the day de-  
scribes him as follows:  
"He was attired in a bottle-green  
frock coat, and a waistcoat of white  
of the Eton School pattern, the front of  
which exhibited a new 's' of Heriot's  
extra, large, fancy pantaloons, and a  
black tie, above which no shirt collar  
was visible, computed the outward  
man. A countenance vividly pale, set  
off by a pair of intensely black eyes,  
and a broad, but not very high fore-  
head, overhung by clustering ringlets  
of coal black hair, which, combed away  
from the temple, fell in bunches of  
well-oiled ringlets over his left cheek."

He was interrupted and he was heck-  
led and he was opposed to such an ex-  
tent that he was compelled to take his  
seat, but before he did so he pointed his  
finger in the direction of those who  
were responsible for his discomfort and  
exclaimed:  
"The time will come when you will  
hear me!"

And the time did come—sooner than  
they expected.  
He became the Prime Minister, with  
great power, and one of his first moves  
was to add to the royal title. It was  
in the beginning of the Parliamentary  
session of 1876 that Mr. Disraeli an-  
nounced that the Queen was to be  
called Empress of India. Generally  
speaking the announcement was well  
and favorably received, but a strong  
and assertive minority sprang up and  
expressed its dissent. It was held that  
the addition was unnecessary, that it  
was vain and childish, and that it  
would detract from the dignity of the  
royal office. But Disraeli took the  
opposite view. He insisted that it was  
not a mere whim, but that the move  
had been taken with deliberate and  
desirable.

There were stirring debates in the  
House of Commons, where, as a rule,  
he was in the habit of saying what  
they think. It became a sort of party  
issue, with the Liberals strong in the  
opposition. Joseph Cowen made a  
speech on the subject that made him  
a reputation as an orator. He was  
invited then as William Jennings Bryan  
was hailed in the United States on the  
occasion of his celebrated "Cross of  
Gold" speech.

Disraeli, who felt confident of gaining  
his point, had a great deal of fun  
with his opponents. He handled them  
as a cat does a mouse before he  
ready to pounce on the poor creature.  
Among other things he told of a letter  
he had received from a young girl at  
boarding school in which she said that  
she was very much interested in the  
"Empress of India" in Guy's geography  
which was in use in the establishment.  
This roused the ire of the opponents of  
the measure, who insisted that the sub-  
ject was not being treated in a dignified  
manner.

They objected to having the "Empress  
of India" introduced into a debate  
in the House of Commons. It was  
But Disraeli smiled and waited for  
his moment. It came sooner than he  
had expected. Mr. Lowe in a public  
speech said the Queen had attempted  
to induce two erstwhile ministers  
to confer the title on her but had failed.

It was an unfortunate assertion, but  
it was just what was needed to make  
the triumph of Disraeli complete.  
He made it the text for one of the  
greatest speeches ever made in House  
of Commons. The Queen was greatly  
beloved and anything reflecting upon  
her was bound to arouse the people.  
So the shrewd Prime Minister denou-  
ced Mr. Lowe for his assertion. Dis-  
raeli scored the thoughtless member  
without mercy, and he finally con-  
cluded with the announcement that he  
had the authority of the Queen herself  
to deny the statement. The result  
was just what he had anticipated. The  
authority for conferring the new title  
on Victoria was agreed by a practi-  
cally unanimous vote.

It was said later that there was a  
question of taking the action in ad-  
dition to adding to the dignity of the  
Queen. It was made pretty clear that  
it was necessary to assert the position  
of the Queen as the supreme ruler over  
the Empire of India, and the respec-  
tful Disraeli had taken this means of  
making it known to England and the  
world.

It was a warning, not so much to  
the natives of India as it was to Rus-  
sia, to keep "hands off."

**HAVERHILL FACTORIES  
ARE SHUTTING DOWN**  
Some of the Strikers Are Mov-  
ing Away To Obtain Work  
—Long Strike Probable.

Haverhill, Mass., July 14.—The  
Haverhill shoe factories, where a  
strike was begun last week, are  
twenty per cent. advance in wages,  
are preparing to close and it is be-  
lieved 7,500 operatives will be idle in  
a few days. The manufacturers say  
they will keep the factories closed for  
six months before they will pay the  
advance demanded.

Quite a number of the strikers have  
left Haverhill to obtain employment  
elsewhere in the belief that a pro-  
tracted strike is on foot.
