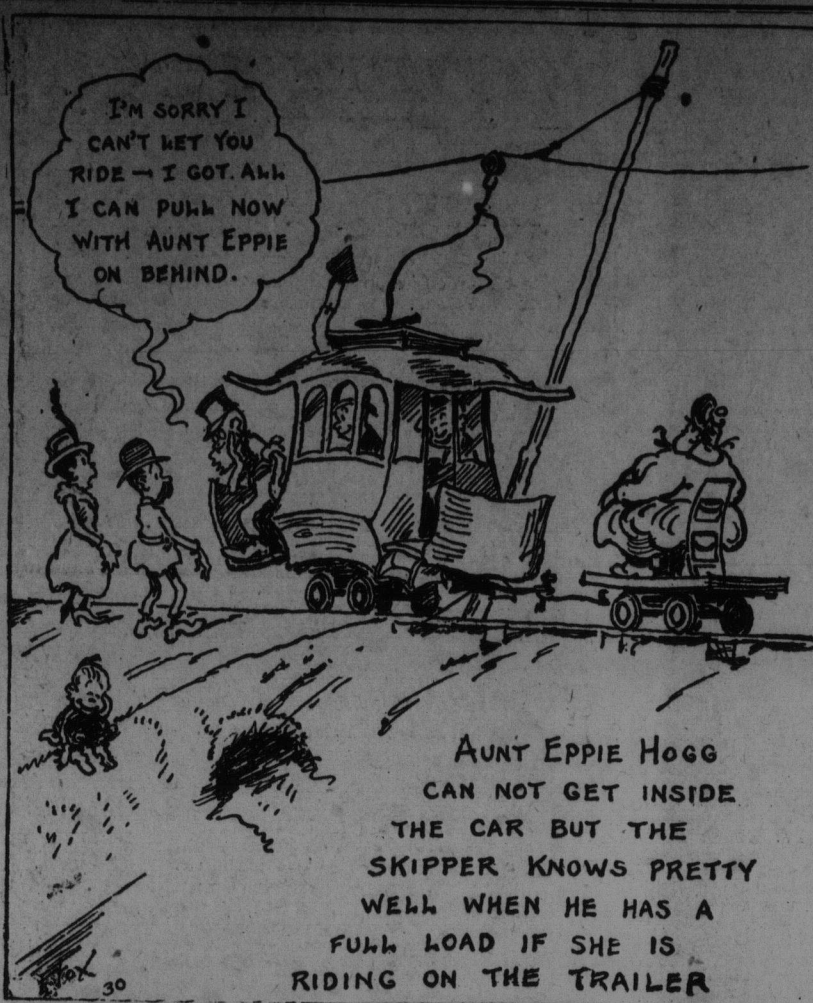

### Mrs. H. Hornbeam And The H. C. L.

Reckons the Old Reprobate in Holland and a Lot of Amateur Kaisers Who Want to Dominate Food Supply Are Responsible.

"I can't tell you much about H. C. L. 'cause I don't know more about it than a politician whose duty it is to look wise and give the people advice you can't make head or tail of," said Mrs. H. Hornbeam. "But I reckon that old reprobate in Holland who's saving firewood as if he'd need it where he's going, had something to do about it, and likewise a lot of amateur kaisers who want to dominate the food supply of the people and teach 'em abstinence, which was reckoned a thousand years or so ago a first class way of making good Christians."

"But when a politician gets up and tells you that the only cure for H. C. L. is increased production and more thrift you want to hold on to your pocket book till he gets out of sight. Increased production! Why, there was never a time when there was such increased production in America. The foreign trade for the U. S. in the year closing July 1 was valued at over ten billions—or more than half the total international trade of the world before the war. And you can't have such a tremendous increase of trade without increased production. Even allowing for increased prices, Prof. Fisher, of Yale, says the general mass of goods have been increased during the war, the physical volume of the trade of U. S. in 1918 being estimated as 41 p. c. greater than in 1913. Yet in that country of increased production, the railway brotherhoods, who are supposed to be very well paid, are so annoyed about the H. C. L. that they want to set up a Soviet system of running affairs."

"Also with all the increased production in U. S., there never was so much thrift of necessity. I read that the Children's Bureau at Washington reports that from three to six million children in U. S. are not getting enough to eat because their parents cannot at present prices buy the nourishing food required. It's shameful irony for politicians to tell the people that they must save and economize when in the midst of the greatest production ever known twenty per cent. of the children of a country are insufficiently nourished. I ain't no use for Bill Johnsonism, but I doubt if his method of getting rid of children wasn't preferable to allowing them to die of malnutrition while profiteers were exporting food out of the country at prices less in many cases than they charged at home."

**CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETING YESTERDAY**

Heads of Sub-Committees Made Final Reports at Meeting Held in Mayor's Office and Final Accounts Were Passed.

The central committee in charge of the "Joy Day" celebrations at noon in the office of Mayor Hayes and passed the accounts of the various sub-committees as presented by the different chairmen. The committee in charge of the feeding of soldiers reported that so far as they could tell about 12,000 meals had been served at a cost of \$1,671.75. The bread left on hand had been disposed of as follows: One hundred loaves to the East St. John Hospital. Three hundred loaves to the Municipal Home. One hundred loaves to the General Public Hospital. The balance was disposed of for cash.
