ARMISTICE DAY WELL OBSERVED AT FREDERICTON

CAPTURED GERMAN **GUNS PRESENTED**

by Lieut.-Col. H. F. McLeod -Two Given to City.

Prederiction. Nov. 11.—Armistice
Day observation in Fredericton today consisted principally of the presentation of eix captured German guns which had been alkited to the government of New Brunswick by the director of Canadian war trophies.

At moon, the fire alarm sounded a warning to the citizens that the period for a pause of two minutes in all activities had arrived. Work of all kinds ceased and people stood in stient thoughtin memory of the heroic dead. The court of appeal was in session at the time and the heading of cases stopped for the shouled period while Sir Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice, and the members of the bench and bar stood silently.

The presentation of the captured German guns took place shortly after two o'clock this afternoon at the square in front of the Parliament buildings. The ceremony was preceded by a parade headed by the military and Boy Scouts and sudents from the city schools, the Normal school and University following.

A Military Parade.

Colonel H. F. McLeod, M. P. as senior military officer in Fredericton, was in command of the parade, with Lieut, C. L. Dougherty as adjutant, and sil divisions, as well as a majority of the brigades of the Canadian corps were represented in the tenantry and artillerymen formerly of the C. E. F. who were in line. As the parade passed down Queen street the marchers were reviewed by Lieut, Governor Pugsley, When the parade arrived at Printament Square the etx guns were placed in position and the programme was then opened with the school children singing "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall," Lieut, Governor Pugsley presided over the exercises and Col. McLeod on behalf of the Federal Government then presented the captured guns to the province.

Premier Foster accepted the guns and after the school children had ading "O Canada." presented two of them to the City of Fredericton, Mayor J. A. Reid made a speech of acceptance, and the programme close with an appropriate eddress by Lieut, Governor Pugsley.
