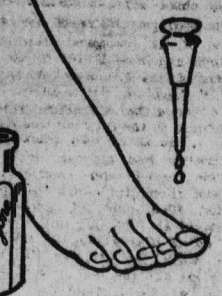

## ARMISTICE DAY WELL OBSERVED AT FREDERICTON

Big Parade of Soldiers and  
School Children Was  
Feature.

CAPTURED GERMAN  
GUNS PRESENTED

Presentation to Province Made  
by Lieut.-Col. H. F. McLeod  
—Two Given to City.

Fredericton, Nov. 11.—Armistice  
Day observation in Fredericton today  
consisted principally of the presenta-  
tion of six captured German guns  
which had been allotted to the govern-  
ment of New Brunswick by the direct-  
or of Canadian war trophies.

At noon the five alarm sounded a  
warning to the citizens that the period  
for a pause of two minutes in all  
activities had arrived. Work of all  
kinds ceased and people stood in  
silent thought in memory of the heroic  
dead. The court of appeal was in  
session at the time and the hearing  
of cases stopped for the allotted peri-  
od while Sir Douglas Hays, Chief  
Justice, and the members of the bench  
and bar stood silently.

The presentation of the captured  
German guns took place shortly after  
two o'clock this afternoon at the  
square in front of the Parliament  
buildings. The ceremony was pre-  
ceded by a parade headed by the  
military and Boy Scouts and students  
from the city schools, the Normal  
school and University following.

A Military Parade.  
Colonel H. F. McLeod, M. P., as  
senior military officer in Fredericton,  
was in command of the parade, with  
Lieut. C. L. Dougherty as adjutant,  
and all divisions, as well as a majority  
of the brigades of the Canadian corps  
were represented in the infantry and  
artillerymen formerly of the C. E. F.  
who were in line. As the parade  
passed down Queen street the march-  
ers were reviewed by Lieut.-Governor  
Ferguson. When the parade arrived  
at Parliament Square the six guns  
were placed in position and the pro-  
gramme was then opened with the  
school children singing "World Never  
Let the Old Flag Fall." Lieut.-Gov-  
nor Ferguson presided over the exer-  
cises and Col. McLeod on behalf of  
the Federal Government then pre-  
sented the captured guns to the provin-  
ce. Premier Ferguson accepted the guns  
and after the school children had  
sung "O Canada," presented two of  
them to the City of Fredericton.

Mayor J. A. Reid made a speech of  
acceptance, and the programme closed  
with an appropriate address by  
Lieut.-Governor Ferguson.

## U. S. MARINES KILL 1,132 HAITIANS IN FIGHT SAYS MAJOR

Port au Prince, Hayti, Nov. 11.—  
Eleven hundred and thirty-two Haitians  
were killed in twenty-eight  
engagements since the intensive cam-  
paign of the United States marines  
began in Haiti in October, 1919, Major  
Thomas C. Turner, adjutant of the  
first provisional brigade of marines  
detached yesterday before the naval  
board of inquiry.

Since the United States occupation  
in Haiti, Major Turner stated, 17,000  
Haitians had been in the field at one  
time and since October, 1919, he  
brought to the number of 7,800 had  
surrendered.

## C. P. R. AIDS UNIVERSITY.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—Recognizing  
the value to the community of a uni-  
versity, specially equipped for the  
French-speaking population, the direc-  
tors of the Canadian Pacific Railway  
Company have voted a contribution of  
\$50,000 to the fund now being raised  
for the University of Montreal.

## Leading Boxing Arena In New York

Madison Square Garden Under  
Management of Tex  
Rickard—Seats 15,000.

The leading boxing arena in New  
York is the Madison Square Garden,  
now under the management of Tex  
Rickard. The seating capacity is 15,  
000, and the gate of a single night's  
show has reached \$66,000. Seven ex-  
hibitions have been given this season,  
which, in the aggregate, have drawn  
\$255,000.

The entrants in the star bouts are  
each paid from \$1,000 upwards. The  
participants in the six-round affairs  
get \$250 each. So close has been the  
matching for the garden bouts that  
in the thirty-two contests thus far  
held, the combined difference in  
weight is less than six pounds. This  
is less than the few knockouts  
resulting, but little men have been  
counted out.

## Other Arenas

The other popular boxing arenas of  
the greater city are Tom McCardle's  
Commonwealth Athletic Club in East  
135th street, with a capacity of 4,500;  
Eddie and Jess McMahon's new star  
casino in Third avenue with 4,000  
seats; Charles Desrosier's Pioneer  
Club in East 24th street with room  
for 5,000 fight fans; the Woodhaven  
Club at Dexter Park, Long Island,  
and the East New York Club, run by  
Amy Mack. The two leading head-  
quarters where the fighters train in  
doors for their matches are the Mar-  
shall Sullivan Gymnasium in 125th  
street and Billy Grupp's Gymnasium  
on West 116th street. Much of the  
indoor track work is done at one or  
another of various Y. M. C. A. gyms,  
throughout the city.

## BANK'S ATTEMPT TO SECURE CASH TO STOP SCHOOL

Action to Recover \$77,800  
from Separate School Board  
at Ottawa is Advanced.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—The probable en-  
forcement and early closing down of all  
the separate schools of the city, to  
the detriment of thousands of children  
attending them, is heralded in pro-  
ceedings which have been instituted  
by the Bank of Nova Scotia, before  
the chief-justice-chambers at Osgoode  
Hall, Toronto.

Acting on behalf of the bank, Mr.  
Charles S. Smith, manager of the Wel-  
lington street branch, through Messrs.  
Hill, Green and Hill, has made an ap-  
plication to the courts, for leave to  
issue a writ of execution of a judgment  
obtained in the Supreme Court of On-  
tario on October 24th, 1919, by the  
Bank of Ottawa, whereby it was en-  
titled to recover from the board of  
trustees of the separate schools of  
Ottawa the sum of \$77,800.25.

Acts On Old Judgment.

The Bank of Nova Scotia seeks to  
recover the amount of the judgment  
together with costs, and the interest  
which has accrued since the date of  
the promulgation, pointing out that its  
right to do so is vested in the agree-  
ment reached on April 30th, 1919,  
whereby the Bank of Ottawa sold and  
transferred all its assets to the Bank  
of Nova Scotia.

The judgment obtained by the Bank  
of Ottawa in 1919, followed the dis-  
missal of the appeal taken to the  
Privy Council by the separate school  
board against an adverse judgment  
rendered, whereby the school board  
was barred from recovering the Que-  
bec Bank, Bank of Ottawa and the ex-  
cess of the government school  
commission, a sum aggregating \$170,  
000, consisting of the sinking fund  
of the schools amounting to \$45,000  
sold by the Bank of Ottawa, \$80,000  
held by the Quebec Bank, and monies  
spent by the school commissioners.

## THREE OFFICERS ARE SHOT DOWN WHEN RAID IS ORDERED

One is Dead and Two Others  
Are Injured in Fight in  
Winnipeg Hotel.

Winnipeg, Nov. 11.—One man is  
dead and two others wounded as the  
result of shooting following a raid at  
the stock yards hotel, St. Boniface,  
early this morning. The dead man is  
Provincial Mounted Inspector Alex.  
McCarthy, shot through the head,  
dying six hours later. The injured  
are: Constable Jack Dineen, shot in  
left shoulder; Constable Utley, shot  
through right shoulder. The man  
who is alleged to have done the shoot-  
ing signed the hotel register "John  
Brown and wife." The shooting oc-  
curred when four morality officials  
entered the building in search of  
liquor. Men and women rushed from  
the hotel, but five were captured and  
held as material witnesses.

## WALL STREET TRAGEDY DUE TO RED LABOR

New York Paper Charges Ex-  
plosion Was An Attack on  
Building Trust Craft.

FOREIGN WORKERS  
DRIVEN TO DEED

Driver of Death Cart Did Not  
Know Bomb Was Part of  
the Load He Hauled.

Naming a union and pointing out  
that Brindell had many enemies in  
labor ranks, the Evening World says:  
"The Evening World here presents  
proof that 1,800 men, nearly all for-  
eign born, seditious, industrious, obedient  
and well disciplined have within a  
space of eighteen months been sub-  
jected to an amazing conspiracy of  
greed and injustice, and the explosion  
was the culmination of this tragedy."  
"The Evening World does not  
charge the union, as a union, with  
responsibility. It was work of indi-  
viduals, possibly inside the union, pos-  
sibly the work of sympathizers."

Driver Was Innocent  
The paper, setting forth its theory,  
asserted members of the regular union  
had been kicked off every building job  
in New York; that they were half  
starved by months of idleness; that  
unknown to its driver, a wagon con-  
taining a time bomb was sent to the  
Stock Exchange by "friendly work-  
men of sympathizers," to "get" 85  
Brindell workers alleged to have been  
engaged on the job by the wrecking  
firm of Albert A. Volk; that the wagon  
became tied up and could not get near  
the building; and that when the driver  
went to telephone, the bomb exploded.

The paper charges that Raymond  
Clark, a foreman on the job who was  
reported to have said he had seen the  
driver was shot within three weeks,  
in an attempt to silence him forever.

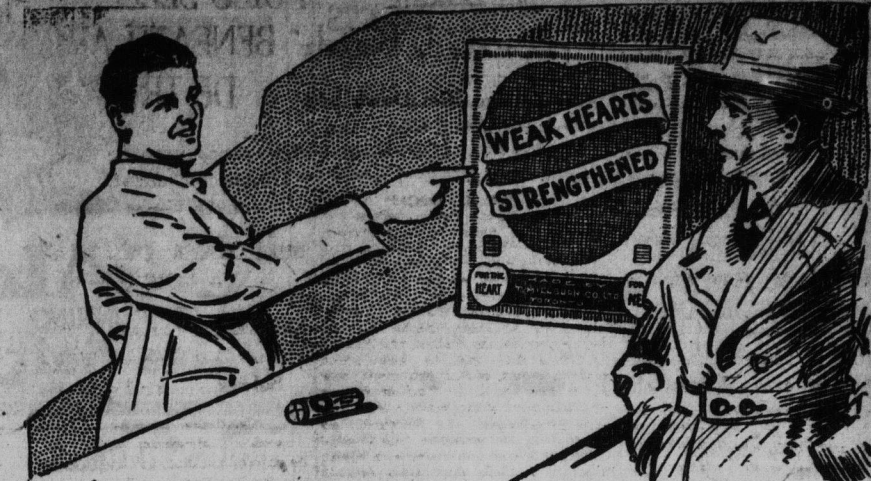
## BAPTIST CHURCH TO BE RE-DEDICATED

## NOVA SCOTIA SELLS BIG BOND ISSUES

Toronto, Nov. 11.—A bond issue by  
the Province of Nova Scotia for \$2,  
000,000 was sold yesterday to the Do-  
minion Securities Corporation, Toron-  
to, and Wm. A. Reid and Company,  
New York. The bonds will be placed  
in the market at 105. At the price  
paid, the province borrows at the rate  
of about 5.72 Canadian funds, or 7.27  
United States funds, allowing for tax  
change at the rate of four per cent.  
The bonds bear six per cent. and bids  
were asked for 5 and 10 years, payable  
in New York, and for 10 and 20 years  
payable in Canada. The offer for ten  
year United States bonds was accept-  
ed.
