The Competitive Examination of the Public Schools of the Township of Ramsay was held in the School-buildings at Almonts on Wednesday the 15th inst. The Examiners were H. L. Slack, Esq., County Inspector, Irwin Stuart, Esq., formerly Head master of Carleton Place High School, John McCarter, Esq., Head master Almonte Public Schools and Rev. J. K. McMorine. The Rev. Mr. Bennett and many parents and friends were present throughout the day. Eleven out of the fourteen sections of the Township sent representative pupils. in all fifty-eight in number, and selected from the 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th classesthe examination on the whole was a decided improvement on last year. The second class was particularly good. In Reading however there was no marked excellence, School section No. 10 Ramsay (Bennies Corners), T. B. Caswell Teacher, succeeded in carrying off the greatest number of prizes; the Clayton and Appleton schools Nos 4 and 11 being next in order, followed by Nos 15 and 12. All the schools were more or less successful. The best Prizes viz. 1st General Proficiency were taken in the 2nd class by Anne Neilson and Mary Cram both of 8 8 11, in the 3rd class by Robert McDonald 8 8 15; in the 4th class by John Anderson 8 S 10; and in the 5th class by Sarah Belton and Agaes Bellamy S S 4, After the presentation of the prizes remarks were made by Rev. Messrs. Bennett and Mc Morine respecting the successful issue of the examination, and by H. L. Slack, Esq., on the proper method of distributing prizes, viz, according to merit and to that alone. He explained to the hildren that if these competitive Exminations were to be carried out their proper spirit the competition must begin first in each school as to who should be selected to represent it at the examination. This in itself was a mark of dis tinction, but would not necessarily secure the competitor a prize. It had to be fought for and won. He compared it to the Rifle contest of Wimbledon, Canada sent a team of her best marksmen every before any marked improvement in the year, and it was an honorable distinction to be one of that number, but then aurels had to be won subsequently in competition with other representative shots.
