El Paso, Texas, March 18.—United States soldiers and immigration officers today were patrolling the Mexican border near here, where from 10 o'clock last night until 1 a.m., they had exchanged shots with a party believed to be Mexican smugglers, in which three United States soldiers were wounded.

The Mexicans opened fire on three United States immigration officers who discovered the Mexicans fording the Rio Grande, which is about 50 yards wide at that point.
