The Municipal Pot and Civic Government.

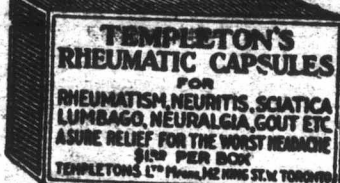
With nomination day only a few days away, there is scarcely a simmer on the surface of the municipal pot in either village or township. In the township Reeve Griffith will seek re-election, and rumor states that he will be opposed by one of the councillors or an ex-reeve, while it is altogether probable that there will be new aspirants for the council. In Havelock Reeve Mathison has decided to stand for another year, and rumor again says that there will be a contest for the chief chair of honor, the names of Coun. W. H. Jones, Coun. S. S. Joyce and Mr. W. Thos. Curtis, being mentioned as probable opponents. There is almost a certainty that there will be a contest for the councillors, and there are three school trustees to be elected, the retiring members being J. V. A. Coon, Robt. Jack and J. J. Carter.

On Monday next the people of Havelock will be called upon to nominate the council and the three members of the School Board. In the meantime the ratepayers should be considering and discussing the absolute importance of getting a council composed of the best material the town affords. Every vital interest of the town is at stake when the selection is made, and there is not an individual who will not feel the effect of the choice the electors will make, especially in view of the fact next year will, in all probability, see the inception of Hydro, necessitating thereby, a busy civic year and much responsibility. The council elect for 1920 should be men who have a strong sense of civic responsibility and a desire to unselfishly serve their fellow citizens, and the fact that there is real work ahead should prove an incentive rather than an obstacle. It is a time when strong men are needed and only those of the right calibre should be nominated and elected.

On the other hand when good men are elected, it is up to the citizens to see that their representatives are not subject to slander or vilification, but heartily supported in their endeavours to give the citizens good service and economical administration. It is in no small degree due to the fact that councillors are too often subjected to a campaign of misrepresentation and slander, that have kept good men out of the field in the past.

Think these things over seriously and go to the nomination prepared to choose the best men possible to represent Havelock in the coming year.
