Mr. Macdonald was advise Mr. Boyd would investigate and he would be apprise the result.

and the Foster Lot and report, and his report has been received in which he says that the Department could not have been well advised as to the value of the Foster Lot as to its value and a mistake was made in purchasing it. The term "wood lot" as applied to it is a distinct misnomer, as there is very little wood on it, other than alder bushes and young growth of white birch. The Superintendent says he saw no material suitable for fencing, or tub-making, axe handles, baskets and such articles as are usually manufactured by Micmac Indians, and why it was purchased instead of Sproule's property seems strange indeed.
