No. 3. Your telegram No 1527 of September 30th, and your telegram No 1653 of October 22nd.

In view of developments of concentrated attacks on various cities of the United Kingdom and consequent strain placed on fire-fighting personnel in this country, Home Office are anxious to reopen discussions regarding offers of firemen from Canadian municipalities.

It is expected proposals somewhat along following lines will be made by United Kingdom Government shortly;

- (1) Experienced firemen from Canada would be regarded as Volunteer Canadian Contingent to be divided into units of about 100 men for service either (a) in general service attached to regular brigades, or (b) special emergency units for supplementary water supplies, and heavy fire-fighting duties to be held in reserve for transfer to meet emergencies.
- (2) In either case formations would be organized as Canadian units with their own officers; but attached to one or more particular brigades.
- (3) In either case it is understood that the Canadian officers would be responsible for discipline, and administration, and would be under orders only in matters concerned with operations.
