At about 1930 hrs., 9 Jan. '44, I was walking along the road with Ser. Lee, G.M., and Ser. Bothues and I saw two figures slip off the side of the road. On investigating I found that it was Ser. Longbotham and an Italian boy. I took Ser. Longbotham in charge and returned him to camp where I turned him over to the Corporal of the Guard.
