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## THE CADET SYSTEM IN SCHOOLS.

There are Cenadians who object to the introduction of cadet drill into the schools because they think it develops e spirit of militerism. Experience has proved that this view is incorrect. Boys thoroughly enjoy cadet work without any direct consciousness of its reletionship to war. The hoy thinks only of the immediate effort, the immediate discipline, and the immediate enjoyment, and not of any ultimate and distant possibility. This well known psychological principle has a most important hearing on the whole question of the desirebility of introducing cadet work into the schools.

It should be remembered in this connection thet soldiers do not cause wer. Grave dissensions between nations result from differences hetween the political snd financial leaders of different countries, not from enything the soldiers of the rivel countries say or do. The soldier is not the war-monger. Ho is more likely to become the war-victim.

There ere men who ettack those who advocate cedet work in the schools, and who cherge them with epproving of "conscription." This cherge has absolutely no foundation. The cadet system is a rational substitute for conscription. It avoids all the evils of conscription, and it develops the hest elements of human power and charecter, while at the same timo it secures all the supposed edvantages of conscription in the most natural and the most thoroughly effective way. Those who attack the principle of universal training are evidently not awere of the fact that the law of Canada now recognizes the principle that all men, with comparatively few exceptions, 'ere responsible for the defence of their country. Between the ages of eighteen end forty-five, inclusive, men ere now, hy law. liablo to be called upon when necessary to do military service in the defence of their country. There is no logical hasis for good citizenship but the one that recognizes a man's duties 37176-1

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
