Note 1  
 In the Maritime Provinces and southern portions of the other provinces, the Indians are on reserves. The limits are drawn half-way between the reserves and therefore, the colours do not signify that the Indians actually inhabit more than an inconsiderable portion of these areas.

NOTE 2—Since the map was printed, Mr. V. Stefansson has reported that the coast between the Gulf of Boothia and the Arctic Ocean is not a continuous one.

NOTE 3—In the summer, the Chipewyan occupy the country east of Great Bear Lake. They do not come more than 500 miles west to the west end of the lake.

NOTE 4—Mr. Stefansson has found that the areas reported by him to be occupied by the Eskimo in Banks and Victoria Islands are inhabited by the Eskimo. Further explorations in the Banks Islands had been abandoned by them and that only a few Eskimo areas in Victoria Islands were inhabited.
