SIR THOMAS PICTON, in whose honor the town of Picton was named by the Rev. W. Macaulay. He led the famous "Fighting Division" of Wellington's army in Spain, distinguished himself at Busaco, Badajos, Fuentes D'Onoro, and at Toulouse and other places in the war, was wounded at Quatre Bras and killed at Waterloo, June 18th, 1815, and is buried in St. Paul's, London.

REV. W. MACAULAY

REV. W. MACAULAY—Born of U. E. Loyalists parents at Kingston, 1794. Was educated at Cornwall U. C. and Oxford, England, ordained 1818 and returned to Canada as rector of Cobourg and Chaplain of the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada. In 1827 he went to Prince Edward County as Resident Missionary of the Anglican Church, and for 47 years was rector of the parish of Picton. When the village of Hallowell was incorporated as a town he was instrumental in having it named Picton after this great Cavalry Officer of Wellington's army. Many Old Boys will remember his hale old countenance.
